**Brazilian Fanatics.**  
 According to the latest accounts from Brazil, says the *Pall Mall Gazette* of Sept. 6, an insurrection exists in the Rio Grande do Sul, owing to the fanaticism of a sect which has sprung up among the German colonists of St. Leopoldo. The leader of this sect is a German named Maurer, who professes to be a prophet, a profession which, like many others, is fast becoming overstocked. Maurer's wife, Jacobs, who deserves no small credit for discovering a useful employment for women, is supposed by his votaries to be a new savior of the world, and his uncle, contented with a humbler position, proclaims himself to be the Apostle Judas, and is looked upon by the sect as a first-class martyr, having, on his own account, sacrificed himself to bring about the Bible prophecies relating to the death of Christ. The turbulence of the sect some time ago caused much disturbance in the colony, and the Police found it necessary to arrest Maurer, his wife, and the Apostle Judas. Maurer, on being released, took himself off to the gold washings which he found so profitable an occupation that he kept 150 men at work for himself. Lately, however, he returned to the colony, and his advent was not peace, for on the night of the 25th of June the forebodings of the colonists when they saw him return were fully realized, the house of a seceder from the sect being attacked and burned, the wife and children of the seceder shot—the man, fortunately for himself, being absent and thus escaping death. When the Police arrived they found Maurer and his followers, some 300 strong, entrenched in a midforest settlement, to which the only approach was by narrow roads, and although a force of regulars was brought up to aid, the soldiery were repulsed with a loss of five killed and thirty-five wounded. At last dates troops and national guards were being collected, and Maurer and his sect were undergoing the process of bombardment by cannon. Thirteen more families of seceders and "lukewarm sectarians" had, it is stated, been massacred by these fanatics, and although no special mention is made of the part poor old Uncle Judas is playing in these late proceedings, there can be little doubt he is not behind-hand in keeping up the honor of the family.

**TAKEN IN.**—Even in this age of newspapers, when the tricks of sharpers are so fully exposed, people are simple enough to be taken in. At the races in Waterloo last week a green chap from Wellesley was the temporary victim of a neat little confidence dodge. He made the acquaintance of a smart young man, who wanted to play a nice little game that was going on near by, but was short of funds. So greeney was persuaded to lend him a little, with which the game was started, and of course the mutual friend won. Then higher stakes were indulged in with varying success, till at last the countryman's pile was all leveled, and as ill-luck would have it—lost. Then he wanted his money back, but could not get it until the aid of a town constable was called into requisition.

**St. George.**—The Reporter says that the opening of the Great Western station at this village has brightened its prospects considerably, and business men and all others having an interest in the village feel much elated at the consummation of this long looked for improvement. All trains east and west on the main line, except expresses, now stop at St. George Station—West at 10 o'clock, a.m., and 6:30 p.m.; east, 8 o'clock, a.m., and 8:05 p.m. All freight can now also be forwarded to or shipped from the village direct.

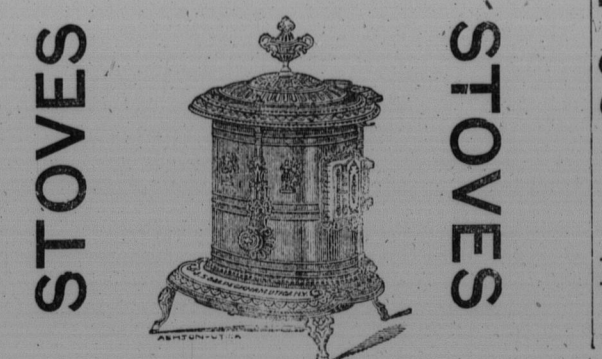
