Council met at the call of the Reeve. Members all present. Minutes of previous meeting read and signed.

Rogers, nails, &c., \$7.82; W. B. Parks, salary in full as nuisance inspector, \$18.75; Jas. Harris, irons for drains and repairing fire engine, \$8.75; John Orange, repairs to fire hall and engine, \$1.50; S. D. Walker, broom, 30c.; G. M. Harrison, salary as clerk, &c. \$69; C. McCarty, ditching, \$11; W. Gales, for wood, town hall, \$2.65; E. Marshall, work on drain, \$31.75; do., balance in full of contract, \$5; P. Moved by J. W. Campbell, seconded by W. Swaisland, that the following accounts be paid:—J. Watterworth, for tile, \$5.12; Geo. Dobie, do., \$1.75. Carried.
