Steamships Running on a New RouteMontreal To Be Visited by French
War Ships-English-Speaking
Residents Ignored.

Montreal, Aug. 3.—The first two trips of the steamships running on the new route between Jamaica and Montreal have turned out fairly successful. The last cargo of fruit, however, was over-ripe and brought low prices owing to bad handling and detention to the boat. Another steamer is to be put on the route, but the promoters say the Government must give them a subsidy or they will make Boston the terminus instead of Montreal.
