**A Seven-Year-Old Girl Burned to Death at Windsor.**

**Peculiar Charge of Robbery Against a Well-To-Do Farmer.**

**Important Ruling in Regard to Cattle "At Large"—Sad Death of a Minister's Young Wife—Diphtheria in Downie.**

Blenheim is getting granolithic walks. Over \$2,000 were paid out today by the Cortland Cheese Company at Tilsonburg to the Patrons for September. W. R. Carr, V.S., Kirkton, who received severe injuries while dehorning cattle at S. Whaley's, Blanshard, is recovering.

At the South Essex Teachers' Convention in Essex, Nov. 1 and 2, Rev. Morgan Wood will speak on "An Average Man."

W. Blake, of Tilbury, had his arm caught and badly jammed in the lathe in Brown's foundry. The accident was quite a serious one.

Andrew Sutherland, Ingersoll, has been appointed a bailiff in the Fifth Division Court of Oxford, in place of W. H. Cody, resigned.

The Windsor Electric Railway Company intends to erect a three-story brick building on Sandwich street, at Brock street, to be used as a waiting room, offices and store.

The Robertson farm of 150 acres, near the Little Lakes, was auctioned off on the market square at Stratford on Saturday. Hugh Hannon, St. Mary's road, bought it for \$7,000.

Wm. Watling, a Grand Trunk yardman, who lives on Argyle street, Stratford, was coupling cars Saturday, when he got jammed between two draw-heads, and the thumb and two fingers were cut off.

A Dresden correspondent says: Frank McKim, of Dawn Mills, had a close call from being killed by a steam train. The animal knuckled him down and pummeled him with its head for several minutes.

Messrs. McKay and Bennett, near Merlin, who are working Stanley Leathbridge's farm of 50 acres on shares, raised 400 bushels of corn off of 2 1/2 acres of land. One hundred and eighty bushels were husked off one acre.

Burglars were busy Sunday night in Chatham. They entered Houston's blacksmith shop, Taylor's cigar store next Hoig's tailoring establishment, and John Pigott's residence, Lacroix street. At Houston's they secured some tools; Taylor Bros.' loss is about \$35; Mr. Hoig's, \$100; Mr. Pigott's, \$100. The police have been unable to collect his wages he attempted to steal a ride home, fell off the cars, and his leg was severed. He was taken to the hospital, but succumbed to the shock. McCurdy was about 24 years old.

The year-old daughter of Ovid Moreau, of Windsor, met a horrible death while visiting her uncle, Farmer Langlois, in Sandwich East, on Sunday. Being left alone for a short time she amused herself by throwing kerosene in the kitchen stove. Her dress caught fire, and although uncle ran to her assistance and extinguished the flames with a quilt, she was so horribly burned that she died in a few hours.

A serious burning accident occurred at Putnam, five miles west of Ingersoll, on Friday night, and the victims, Mrs. Fred Collins, landlady of the hotel there, and her sister, Mrs. Boulding, narrowly escaped death. In lowering a hanging lamp to extinguish it, it fell and exploded, setting fire to Mrs. Boulding's clothing. Mrs. Collins endeavored to extinguish the flames, and both sisters were badly injured.

Glanworth Presbyterian Church anniversary services were conducted Sunday by Rev. Alex. Henderson, of Appin. The fine brick church built there some six years ago was filled in the morning, and to overflowing in the evening with intelligent and attentive audiences. Mr. Henderson also addressed a large congregation in the church near Pond Mills in the afternoon. The esteemed pastor, Rev. E. H. Savers, has done excellent work in that township.

Mr. Justice Osler says: Cattle are "at large" on a highway within the meaning of §1 Vic. (D.), ch. 22, sec. 1, when the herdman in following one of the herd that has strayed, gets so far from the main body that he is unable to reach them in time to drive them over a railway crossing. The question whether or not they are "at large" need not under all circumstances be submitted to the jury, if the case is being tried before one. The judge may decide that there is no evidence that plaintiff is not within the prohibition of the act.

James Ancher, a well-to-do German farmer from Maldstone, was before Magistrate Bartlett at Windsor Saturday on a charge of robbing Nelson Merow of 120 bushels of corn in the ear. Ancher had an arrangement with Merow by which he was to lend the plow man and man to Merow whenever wanted, and the latter was to repay him by giving him three days' work for every day the team worked for him. Ancher to take out of the cash was not forthcoming. Finding himself unable to collect \$12 that was due, Ancher took 120 bushels of corn, in spite of Merow's protest. Magistrate Bartlett committed defendant for trial.

**BANQUE DU PEUPLE REOPENED.** Montreal, Nov. 5.—The Banque du Peuple, which suspended three months ago, opened again yesterday, and a crowd was around all morning drawing 25 per cent of their deposits, as promised.

**LOCAL BREVITIES.**

—It was not Mr. John Whittaker, the well-known slate roofer, of King street, who was fined yesterday for drunkenness.

—An elderly man named John Leach has been committed for trial on a charge of stealing a chain from Wm. Moore, of Newbury.

—The condition of some of the typhoid fever patients at the City Hospital would not permit of holding the regular religious services on Sunday. The street railway company began work on their Ridout street line, south of Dundas, this morning. The Oxford street line was commenced this afternoon.

—A convention of the Anglican Sunday school workers of Middlesex Denamery is being held at Denham Station this afternoon and evening. Between 50 and 75 Londoners are in attendance.

—Edward Norris, a colored barber with a wooden leg, was remanded for a week by the police magistrate today. He has been drinking pretty heavily, and the court made the remand to get him sobered up.

—C. G. Horetzky, engineer of the public works department, Toronto, is advising Dr. C. T. Campbell, chairman of the Board of Health, with reference to the solution of the sewerage problem.

—Mr. Wm. Eckert has obtained a permit to erect a residence on Dundas street east of a cost of \$1,500. W. A. Westland will build two frame cottages on Bruce street at a cost of \$700, and James Down has permission to build a coal shed on the Hamilton road.

—A young married woman belonging to St. Thomas was thrown from her bicycle while trying to pass a buggy on the Wharncliffe road on Sunday. She received a severe fracture of the right wrist and arm and a general laceration of the nervous system. The lady was conveyed to a physician's, and after having her arm dressed was driven home.

—Chang Kee, a Richmond street celestial, has sworn an information against a local boy named "Red," living at 131 Fullarton street. Chang charges the lad with throwing a stone through a window and doing a dollar's worth of damage. The laundryman claims to have suffered great inconvenience through the depredations of an army of small boys living in his neighborhood.

—Since the recent visit to London of Supreme Commander D. P. Mackay and other high officials of the O. T. C., the local rank of the society have been receiving numerous accessions. Official reports show that during the first nine months of 1895, as compared with 1894, the order gained 130 tents and initiated 700 new members. Its beneficial conditions are remarkably favorable, hence its steadily growing strength and popularity.

**BROKE HIS LEG.** A little 8-year-old boy named Roy McCully, living at 378 Egerton street, East London, is in the City Hospital nursing a compound fracture of the right leg. He was playing yesterday in front of his home with a number of other children, and started to climb the road nearly just as a wheelman came along at an ordinary speed. The lad was struck on the leg by the bicycle and knocked down, receiving the fracture below the knee.

**A FIRE SCARE.**

People in the neighborhood of Dundas Center Church, which is in course of erection, were very much alarmed on Friday evening last, when their attention was drawn by the shouts of children to what seemed to be a fire in the upper portion of the southwest tower. The light was dark, and a dim glow could be seen in the tower that lent fears to the suspicions of the children. Messrs. John H. Goodie and Isaac Webster, whose attention had been called to the matter, climbed the ladder to the tower and found a pall of glowing coals and a piece of wood burning in a rather dangerous place. Mr. Goodie threw the pall and contents to the ground. The fire was nearly out, but the men, who thought the mass was out when they left. They claim that the piece of wood in the pall must have been put there by boys.

**WESTERN UNIVERSITY STUDENTS ORGANIZE.**

A very largely attended meeting of the members of the arts, divinity and medical departments of the Western University was held last night, and a society to be known as the Western University Literary and Musical Society was organized. The officers elected were: Patron, Chief Justice Meredith; honorary president, Dr. Moorehouse; president, Mr. D. Collins; first vice, Mr. W. Kalbfleisch; musical director, Mr. H. Tanocok; secretary, Mr. E. T. Smith; treasurer, Miss Burns. The literary committee consisted of Messrs. T. R. Westgate (divinity), D. Annot (medical), and F. Waide (arts); the musical committee, Messrs. George Abey (divinity), Miss Guillemot (arts), and J. Egbert (medical). A committee comprising Messrs. E. B. McMillan, C. A. Anderson and W. Kalbfleisch was empowered to draft a constitution to be presented at the next meeting. The society will meet every second Friday evening at 8 o'clock.

The university is making marvelous strides. There are now over 60 pupils in the arts course.

**TELEGRAPHIC BREVITIES**

Mayor Kennedy, of Toronto, is seriously ill, and will go south as soon as his term of office expires.

Rev. Peter Roe, late of Inverness, Que., and brother of Archdeacon Roe, of Quebec, died at his residence, Niagara, last evening, aged 75 years.

The French Ministerial declaration of policy promises further inquiry into and the publication of the fullest information possible regarding the Southern Railway scandal.

As a tribute of respect to the late Mr. Joseph Thompson, the African traveler, a subscription has been opened for the purpose of erecting a memorial monument over his grave at Thornhill, Dumfriesshire, Scotland.

J. L. Hand, of Pelham, Ga., is known as the watermelon king. He plants several thousand acres of seed every spring, and in the summer season ships hundreds of carloads of melons north.—Baltimore Herald.

The president Cleveland has appointed James B. Angel, of Michigan, John E. Rusel, of Massachusetts, and Lyman E. Conley, of Illinois, to be commissioners to make inquiry and report upon the feasibility of a deep water canal between the great lakes and the Atlantic Ocean.

**HORSELESS CARRIAGES.**

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 5.—Two motor-cycles—a German machine and a machine from Springfield—started from the Midway in Jackson Park for a 100-mile run to Waukegan and back. \$500 having been offered by Mr. H. H. Kofussat for the winner in the race.

The start was made at 9:15 o'clock from the corner of Halsted street and Fifty-eighth street boulevard, the official starting place, and a time limit of 12 hours put upon the machines. The German machine was the only one which made the distance in the prescribed time, coming in at the end of the course, the Grant monument in Lincoln Park, at 6:45 p.m., thus making the distance in 9 hours, 30 minutes.

The Springfield machine broke down before it got to Waukegan, the turning point, and was shipped back to Chicago. Both machines are propelled by gasoline. The winner is a four-seated and the other a two-seated vehicle.

Owing to the many difficulties in the way, the official contest will not take place until Thanksgiving Day, when it is expected that at least 50 machines will enter. That great interest was taken in the contest was made evident by the fact that nearly 15,000 persons lined the Midway and the boulevards along which the competing machines passed.
