Quebec Archbishop's Extraordinary Decree Anent the School Question.

No One Must Accept Doctrines or Writ-Disapprove.

Quebec, Jan. 18 .- Archbishop Begin of Quebec, has just addressed a vol-uminous paper to the Catholic clergy of Quebec Province. The following is a verbatim translation of the most important paragraphs of the article. "No bishop wants, or can approve the so-called settlement of the Mani toba school question, which definitely rests only upon the unjustifiable aban-donment of the best established and most sacred rights of the Catholic

minority.
"Mgr. Langevin's energetic protest against this settlemenet was in ordance with the direction of the Holy Father.

This is not the time to examine this settlement in its various articles, but what I have already said and written is sufficient for you to conclude that I absolutely disapprove of it.
"In his encyclical to the French nation, Leo XIII. said: (The following is published in Latin in the circular.)
But the church, that guardian and safeguard of the integrity of the faith bequeathed her by the authority of God, the foundator, shall call all the nations to a Christian wisdom, and also see by what precepts and institu-tions we cultivate the youth who shall not be formed in mixed and neutral schools that the church has always openly condemned, and she (the church) shall warn the fathers of families to watch the eminent danger for the soul

in this moment.' "Following the example led by other bishops of the Dominion with a view to come to the aid of our brethren of Manitoba until justice is rendered them, I ask \$5 from each curate, \$2 from each poor missionary, vicary and college professor, and \$10 from each religious community. "This money shall be sent to me be-

fore Lent." The fifth article of Mgr. Begin's circular is totally devoted to City Clerk David's book, entitled "Le Clerge Canin the world. David's book, entitled "Le Clerge Canadien, sa Mission son Oeuvre." It is condemned indignantly, and it is announced that "Every faithful is obliged, under the penalty of a grievous sin, to immediately destroy or remit to his confessor Mr. David's pamphlet. "No one shall forget that nobody has any right to judge, condemn or approve authoritatively any doctrine or writing, except the bishops. It is an abuse to buy under cover of the authority of certain personages dangerous writings. It is through your bishops and priests that you shall re-ceive the teachings and directions of the Holy See.

"Let every one of you have enough of Christian sense to banish from your house any man or writing which may teach you, in the name of whatever dignitary, not to respect and listen to the bishops whom the Pope himself gave you to govern you, and whom he ordered you to obey you as if it war Jesus Christ.
"The laws of the church's govern-

ment do not change under the caprice and passions of the public as the laws of parliaments and governments do "And today, as ever, to be with the Pope, you must not put yourself in op-position to the bishops."
