Toronto, April 20, 8 p.m.-A marked change has taken place in the distribution of pressure since last night. A depression of some importance is now centered over Tennessee and another one of equal intensity is situated over Dakota. The weather today through-out the greater portion of Canada has been fine and for the most part extremely mild, especially at inland stations in Ontario where over 70 degrees in the shade has been generally recorded. The outlook now is more un-settled. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Victoria, 42-54; Kamloops, 36-58; Calgary, 36-50; Qu'Appelle, 38-64; Winnipeg, 34-72; Sault Ste. Marie, 46-76; Parry Sound, 28-70; Toronto, 34-57; Ottawa, 36-64; Montreal, 44-60; Quebec, 38-56; Halifax, 44-62. Local temperatures—The highest and lowest readings of the thermometer at the observatory on Friday, April 20, were: Highest, 71; lowest, 34.
