WHEAT CUT DOWN BY HAIL

Thousands of Acres Swept of Crops-Cut Swath 100 Miles Long.

St. Paul, Minn., July 17 .- While it now seems practically certain that no lives were lost in the terrific storms that devastated a portion of the Red River Valley near Grand Forks, N. D. Tuesday night, the loss to farmers will be heavy. Hardly a farm in the pathway of the storm-end it was almost hundred miles, by ten miles wide-but had some building either demolished or damaged. The loss to the wheat crop is reported to have been heavy. Thousands of acres of wheat were literally beaten into the ground by the hail that accompanied the wind and rain. In some places every vestige of the crop was cut out. It is as yet impossible to make any. thing approximating a correct esti-mate of the damage done, but it will doubtless be in the hundreds of thousands of dollars.

FRENCH SENTENCED

Pleaded Guilty to Charge of Common Assault Only.
