TWO HUNDRED LIVES LOST IN A LANDSLIDE IN RUSSIA

Valley Nearly Twelve Miles Long Was Devastated.

TWENTY VILLAGES WIPED OUT

Serious Riots in Hungary—Emperor William's Posee Visit—The Hayti Trouble.

Vienna, Sept. 4.—Correspondence received here from Tiflis, Transcaucasia, Russia, gives a graphic account of a disaster which occurred Aug. 17, when as the result of a landslide supposed to have been due to seismic distur-

ances, some 20 villages were destroyed and nearly 700 persons were killed.

On the northern slope of Mt. Kasbek lies the watering place of Tmenkau. Early in the morning of Aug. 17 subterranean disturbances were noted at Tmenkau, but the hundreds of bathers in the hot springs there

scouted the idea of a catastrophe and, in spite of warnings, continued their bathing.

At 7 o'clock that evening the entire valley where the hot springs are situated was filled with a deafening noise resembling thunder and loud under-

ground rumblings were heard. The valley stream swelled to the dimensions of a mighty torrent and sweeping

along, it carried with it huge blocks of rock and ice. Then the bathers tried to escape, but it was too late.

The entire northern slope of Mount Kasbek, with the glacier above, began to move rapidly. Village after village was swept away, and everything in the path of the landslide was de-

stroyed. Within a few moments the valley, which is nearly twelve miles long, had been devastated by a wall of rock, ice and earth. The valley was completely filled up, in some places to a depth of nearly 1,000 feet, by the matter which was hurled into it.

A fierce hurricane raged at the time of the landslide and the bodies of people and animals were flung to the wind to a great height and dashed against the rocks.

MAY MEET HIS SEDAN. Rev. Dr. Alfred Rowland, of Church End, London, the chairman of the general committee of the Congregational Union of England and Wales, is expected to visit the city.

THE HAYTIAN TROUBLE. London, Sept. 4.—The German steamer Marko Mannia, having on board arms and ammunition sent by the Provisional Government of Cap Haytien, was stopped by the British gunboat Crete-a-Pierrot at the entrance to Cape Haytien, and an armed force sent on board the steamer took possession of the war munitions in spite of the protestations of her captain and the German consul.

Port au Prince, Hayti, Sept. 3.—General Crocyea, the Finistist commander, who is claimed to have set fire and almost entirely destroyed the town of Petit Goave, previous to evacuating it on Aug. 8, has been arrested at Balmel, near Jaelmel.

C. M. R. COMING HOME. Two hundred and fifty-eight officers and men of the Canadian Mounted Infantry sailed on Wednesday on the Elder Dempster liner Lake Erie from Liverpool.

CABLE NOTES. A Paris dispatch says the vicar of Trugueir protests against the proposed statue of Jeanne d'Arc, set fire and almost entirely destroyed the town of Petit Goave, previous to evacuating it on Aug. 8, has been arrested at Balmel, near Jaelmel.

THOUSANDS OF IMMIGRANTS. Mr. Hyman referred to the rush of immigration that has set in to the western country, saying that one of the most remarkable sights that he ever saw was when thousands of people not yet settled were simply living on the cars, and he believes that the immigration has just started. He said that the Americans who are coming over are the best kind of settlers. They bring money and characteristic enterprise with them; they understand our institutions, and they believe, will rapidly assimilate and become excellent citizens.

BRITISH FORCES IN SOUTH AFRICA. Total Number Employed Close On 500,000—The Deaths Were 16,942

London, Sept. 4.—An interesting parliamentary paper, giving a return of the military forces employed in South Africa from the beginning to the end of the late war, was issued today.

The garrison, Aug. 1, 1899, consisted of 318 officers and 9,622 men.

Reinforcements sent between then and the outbreak of hostilities, Oct. 11, 1899, totalled 12,546.

Thereafter the troops sent up to May 31, 1902, reached the great total of 356,051, besides 52,414 men raised in South Africa.

The final casualty figures are: Killed, 5,774; wounded, 23,022; died of wounds or disease, 16,163.

White River Junction, Vt., Sept. 4.—There is no election for governor and lieutenant-governor as the result of the state election Tuesday. As a majority vote is required to elect the choice of governor and lieutenant-governor is thrown into the General Assembly, which convenes the first Wednesday in October. The closeness of the vote is shown by the figures of 290 votes for St. Thomas, D. W. L. E. day, reports encountering a heavy fall of volcanic dust while 800 miles at sea. She also reports that the coast of Hayti was completely obscured by a haze caused by dust.

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TERRITORIES ARE PROSPEROUS.

Mr. Hyman said that there is no doubt whatever of the splendid condition the Territories are in at the present time. The whole immense stretch of country east of the Rockies, he believes to be just at the portal of a great period of prosperity. He said it is not a boom that is responsible for the largely increased interest that is being taken in the West. The country itself is compelling the attention which it is receiving. Its tremendous size and its remarkable fertility, together with the rapidly increasing area of cultivated land, and an improving system of transportation are the factors that are making for the rapid development and wealth of the Canadian West. In the Territories, Mr. Hyman said, that ranching remains the chief industry, but that agriculture was fast becoming a rival of ranching. The prices now being obtained by the rancher were such as allowed him a fair margin of profit and Mr. Hyman said that he noticed an air of buoyancy and prosperity throughout part of the Territories that he was in.

It was the same in Manitoba as in the Territories. An assured crop of unprecedented proportions was having its natural effect upon the people. "We saw the crops being harvested in Minnesota," Mr. Hyman said, "and we saw the crops in Manitoba immediately after. There was no comparison between them while we were in Manitoba we took a special trip of two days 500 miles into Southern Manitoba. It was an exceptional chance to see the wheat fields at their best. Part of the crop was standing, part was cut, some was in the shock, and in places they were threshing. As far as the eye could reach in all that 500 miles we saw nothing but wheat fields. It was a revelation of the immensity of the crop this year, when we considered that the wheat crop in the Territories longer distances in any other direction, and have witnessed similar scenes."

Mr. Hyman was quite confident that the crop will be harvested all right, and he carried to the sea quicker this year than ever before in the history of the west. The question of transportation is the great question of the time, both for Manitoba and the Territories. It was the question which the members from the west most earnestly discussed at the last Parliament, and the prominence that was given
