

# THE LAST SLEEP OF A VETERAN

Stuart, Member of Family of Highland Soldiers.

The death of Mr. Charles Stuart occurred this morning at his residence on the Burwell road, Caradoc, at the age of 81 years. Mr. Stuart had a serious illness some weeks ago, but had fully recovered, except as to his strength. He retired as usual on Thursday evening, and was found dead in bed at an early hour this morning. Mr. Stuart was born at Blair Athol in Perthshire. Scotland, of a family of Highland soldiers, his grandfather having served in India and the peninsula and also having been inspector of military stores in Jamaica during the Napoleonic wars. He came to America with his parents in 1832, staying for a year in the Gen-esee Valley in New York State, whence the family removed to the Scotch Block in the township of Esquesing. where, and in the township of Nassagawaya, he was brought up.
