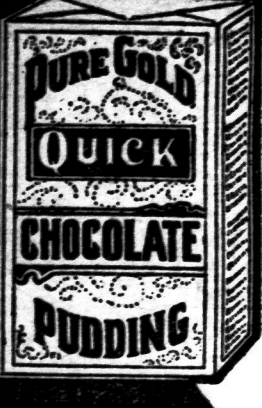

A CUSTOMS PROBLEM FOR WASHINGTON

Some Doubt as to Tariff Rate for Quebec Pulp Paper.

Washington, May 12.—Customs officials are wrestling with a problem which has arisen incidental to the recent action of the Province of Quebec in prohibiting the export of pulpwood from crown lands. It is whether the products, which include printing paper, of pulpwood cut from such lands before May 1, when Quebec's prohibitory decree went into effect, shall be allowed to come into the United States at the tariff rates prevailing prior to that date, or shall be taxed at the lower tariff available since May 1.

FIRE AT THORNDALE IN LUMBER YARDS

Two Thousand Dollars Damage Done to the Stock of Arch Wright.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Thorndale, May 12.—Fire did from \$1,000 to \$2,000 damage to the stock of heading and lumber in the yards of Mr. Arch Wright here yesterday afternoon. Several houses had close calls, but a very efficient bucket brigade prevented further damage. The flames were noticed first about 3 o'clock in the afternoon. The dry heading gave the flames a quick start, and in a very short time a large portion of the stock was in flames. Nearly two hundred farmers and villagers hurried to the scene, and with buckets and ladders confined the fire to a comparatively small area. The wind was from the north, and this saved the major portion of the stock. A house belonging to Mr. Wright, and another belonging to one of his men caught fire, but were saved with slight damage.

Mr. Wright was in the city at the time but drove home in one hour and twenty minutes, which is fast travelling.

It is thought the blaze originated from a locomotive spark or from the smokestack of the plant. The loss is covered by insurance.

ALL HUNAN AFLAME

A Fresh Outbreak of the Anti-Christian Demonstration.

Hankow, May 12.—Outbreaks against foreigners and native Christians have burst out anew and the western portion of Hunan Province is aflame, according to the information received here by roundabout ways. The cutting of all telegraph wires is taken as a confirmation of the worst. The centres is now in the country about Yuen Chow, on the Yuen River, in the southwest part of Hunan.

Many missionaries, American, Norwegian and French, are in the isolated districts and the gravest fears for their safety are entertained.

The province from Shin-Chow, 175 miles west of Changsha, south to the savage Chaung Chong, beyond the Hunan border, 200 miles from Shin-Chow, is in the grip of anti-foreigners, led by the same agitators who caused the recent outbreak at Changsha.

Efforts are being made today to get into communication with the inland mission at Yuen Chow, reported destroyed by a mob.

PREMIER TO TAKE A BRIEF HOLIDAY

To Leave Early in July for the Trip Through the West.

Ottawa, Ont., May 12.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier will go to Nicolet, Que., today to attend the blessing of the new Roman Catholic Church there. Next week he will spend a few days in Quebec city before leaving for his trip through Western Canada. The Premier will probably take a brief holiday next month at his old home in Arthabaska.

BITE KILLED STEER BUT BOY WAS SAVED

Several Serious Cases of Rabies Reported From Kent County.

Toronto, May 12.—From reports by the Dominion and provincial authorities in charge of the joint campaign being waged against rabies, it is feared that Kent County has become a centre of the trouble, and it may be necessary to centralize special preventative methods in that district.

In addition to the cases forwarded to Dr. J. G. Rutherford, the federal veterinary director-general, there were today received by Dr. J. A. Amyot at the provincial laboratory three heads, which showed positive cases of the disease in its most advanced and virulent stages.

A dog's head was received from Blenheim, and Steers' heads from Thameville and Ridgeport. The case of the dog's head is attracting special attention. The animal was bitten by an afflicted dog immediately after the canine had torn the flesh from a boy's leg. The lad came promptly to Toronto, and took the provincial Pasteur treatment, and has apparently escaped the terrible consequences of the bite. The steer, however, developed pronounced symptoms, and ran amuck till it fell dead.

LOCAL OPTION HOUSE AT AILSA CRAIG

The Temperance People Take Over the Queen's Hotel.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ailsa Craig, May 12.—Ailsa Craig adopted local option on the first day of May, but for weeks before the temperance people were preparing for contingencies. A committee of watered proprietors of the two hotels in the town to ascertain if it was their intention to keep open after May 1. Both gentlemen declared it was their intention to close their hotels. One of the people had no wish to go into the hotel business, something had to be done at once. Again the hotel proprietors were waited on with the question: "Will you rent or sell?" Both declined to rent. One put a prohibitive price on his property far above its value; the other would sell at a reasonable figure. The bargain was closed, and the Queen's Hotel, Ailsa Craig, is now being conducted as a temperance house. A

KING GEORGE OBJECTS TO OFFENSIVE OATH

Notifies Ministers He Greatly Objects to References to Catholic Belief.

New York, May 12.—The World's special from London, said King George has suddenly asserted himself in a sensational fashion.

He has notified his ministers that he has an inviolable objection to reciting the declaration which he will have to make the first time he meets Parliament after his accession, because of its offensive references to Catholic beliefs.

When King George appeared at the Privy Council on Monday he had to make another declaration of the same tendency, but much less drastic in its terms, and he informed the privy councillors, to their amazement, that he was not prepared, as derogatory to himself and his Catholic subjects.

This action of the King will arouse violent hostility among certain classes of Protestants. A Protestant meeting has been called to preserve the declaration. The Government intends to introduce an amending bill immediately after the House resumes business, and with alteration, to be effective, must be passed before the opening of next session, when the King will legally be compelled to make the declaration which he has refused to do.

A TRAGIC DOUBLE POISONING CASE

Mother and Son the Victims of a Druggists Mistake.

Eganville, Ont., May 12.—Word comes from Rockingham, in Brudenell Township, thirty miles from here, of a tragic double poisoning case, the victims being Mrs. Kinder and Jos. E. Kinder, wife and son of Dr. Kinder, the former 75 years of age and the latter 30.

On Wednesday of last week each took a dose of what the apothecary told to be Epsom salts. That evening the son was found on the roadside by a neighbor, unconscious. He was taken to the neighbor's house and his father summoned, but he was beyond relief. Next morning he was removed to his home, where he died that evening. The mother lingered until Wednesday morning, when death resulted.

The father purchased his drugs from an Ottawa store, and his theory is that in filling this order some kind of poison was by mistake mixed with the salts. He has taken the matter to the bottle to Toronto for analysis.

GRAND TRUNK APPEALS THE BARNETT JUDGMENT

Company Seeks to Upset Verdict for \$6,000 Secured by Landoner Hurt Last August.

In the court of appeal at Toronto on Wednesday before Moss, C. J. O., Garrow, J., and J. A. A. Meredith, J. A. Sutherland, J. A. Barnett vs. G. T. Railway Co.—D. L. McCarthy, K. C., for defendants; J. F. Edwards (London) and P. H. Bartlett (London) for plaintiffs.

An appeal by defendants from judgment of a divisional court, which allowed an appeal from the trial judge, Edward, dismissed the action, and gave judgment for the plaintiff, Walter C. Barnett, for \$6,000 damages, in an action for \$20,000 damages for the loss of both his legs while a passenger on a train owned and operated by the Pere Marquette Railway. In August, 1908, caused, as alleged, by a collision between a van of defendants and the said Pere Marquette Railway, which accident resulted in the death of Barnett.

KING GEORGE'S HEAD ON NEW COINAGE

No Change as to Stamps for at Least Six Months.

Ottawa, May 12.—The head of King George will not appear on the coins or postage stamps of Canada before the end of the year. The likeness of Edward, the peace-maker, will continue on the currency stamps of Canada for another six months at least. In the case of the postage stamps any design may be used, but it is the custom to have the monarch's head on the two-cent stamp, which is the one most in use. The department has a six months' supply on hand and being prepared for the new issue of George V. stamps.

Changing the design of the metal currency is also a matter of time. Designs have to be prepared and approved in both Canada and Great Britain. Where the head of the King appears on a coin his special approval of the portrait has to be obtained. The finance department has for some time been looking into the question of designs for the new gold coinage of Canada and thereon the head of King George V. will appear, but the first of January will probably be the date of inauguration.

MAY BULLETIN OF LIVE STOCK, CROPS Ontario and Alberta in the Lead With Spring Wheat and Oats.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, May 12.—The census and statistics office has issued today its May bulletin on the condition of crops and live stock for Canada.

The reports made at the end of April show that good progress had been made with spring seeding in Ontario and the other provinces, but that in Quebec and the Maritime Provinces, little more than a beginning had been made. Ontario and Alberta are in the lead with spring wheat and oats—the former with 89.34 per cent of the spring wheat and 74.74 per cent of the oats in the ground, and the latter with 97.50 of the wheat and 73.13 per cent of the oats. Ontario had also 72.94 per cent of the barley seeded, and Alberta only 39.17 per cent. Manitoba and Saskatchewan had nearly equal proportions of the wheatland finished—the former with 90.63 per cent and the latter with 92.60 per cent; but both were slow with oats and barley. British Columbia had a showing of 78.33 per cent for spring wheat sown, of 81.66 per cent for oats and 39.17 for barley.

The Fall Wheat. Ontario and Alberta are the only provinces with a substantial showing of fall wheat, and whilst in the first named the condition at the end of April was 95.47 per cent, in the second it was only 81.66 per cent. Alberta also showed considerable loss by winter-killing and drought, the proportion of the area sown being 22.46 per cent as compared with 6.42 per cent in British Columbia. The loss by winter-killing was five per cent of the area sown, and the condition at the end of April was 100.

The hay and clover meadows suffered by winter-killing 12.80 per cent in British Columbia, and 11.55 per cent in Quebec, but in all the other provinces the loss was comparatively slight. The condition of these crops was good in all the provinces, ranging from 81.85 in Quebec to 102 in Prince Edward Island.

An excellent report was made for all classes of live stock, their condition for all Canada at the end of April was good, with a standard being 94.49 for horses, \$1.09 for milch cows, \$9.53 for other cattle, \$3.70 for sheep and \$5.10 for swine.

BOAT FOUNDERS ON THE MISSISSIPPI

Two Passengers Drowned and Eleven Missing in Disaster Near St. Louis.

[Associated Press.] St. Louis, Mo., May 12.—Two women passengers were drowned and eleven others who are missing are believed to have lost their lives in the Mississippi River when the steamer City of Salt Lake struck a rock and foundered in reach of shore at Glen Park, 24 miles south of St. Louis, late last night.

The dead: Miss Anna Rhea, Nashville, Tenn.; Mrs. Isaac T. Rhea, Nashville; body recovered. The missing and believed dead: S. C. Baker first clerk of the steamer.

Mrs. Joseph Harris, Nashville. Mrs. Archie Patterson, Chester, Ill. Wm. J. Pickett, salesman, St. Louis. Fowler Post, third clerk. Miss Lena Walla, Nashville. Head porter, name unknown. Cabin boy, name unknown. The boat carried 27 passengers, mostly women. She left St. Louis at 7 o'clock with a heavy cargo, including cattle and live stock. The voyage was considered precarious because of the amount of driftwood in the water.

THE NAVY DEPARTMENT

Mr. J. G. Desbarats To Be Made the Deputy Minister.

Ottawa, May 11.—Arrangements are being completed for the creation of the naval department under the minister of marine and fisheries, in accordance with the announcement made in the Commons by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, when the naval bill was going through. J. G. Desbarats, now deputy minister of marine and fisheries, will become deputy minister at the head of the naval department. This department, though under the minister of marine and fisheries, will be entirely separated from the present department of marine and fisheries. It will have not only a separate deputy head but an independent purchasing department. Mr. Johnston, ex-M. P. of Sydney, N. S., will become deputy minister of marine and fisheries.

HIGH MASON DEAD

Hamilton's Assistant Tax Collector Succumbs to a Stroke.

Hamilton, May 12.—While dressing this morning, A. T. Neil, assistant tax collector, dropped dead, evidently having suffered a stroke. He was 65 years of age, and had been a civic employee for 35 years. Past master of Acacia Lodge, A. F. and A. M., he also held other high offices in the Masonic Order, as well as being a chemist and astronomer of local repute. A widow and family survive.

CHAMBERLAIN BETTER

Can Be Seen Daily Walking the Boulevards of France.

[Associated Press.] Cannes, France, May 12.—Joseph Chamberlain, the British statesman, after a long illness, is now in health. He may be seen almost daily promenading the boulevards. Mr. Chamberlain, who had been in ill health for a long time, came here on Feb. 21 to recuperate. A rumor originating in London last night had it that Mr. Chamberlain had died suddenly at his home in Birmingham.

FERROW APPOINTED.

Ottawa, May 11.—The commission of geology has appointed Dr. O. E. Ferrow, of Toronto University, to represent it at the International Congress of Geology to be held shortly at Stockholm.
