So Says Ban B. Johnson in Discussing the Case of Catcher Johnny Kling.

BUT HE WON'T CRITICIZE

For an Argument Now Would Do Organized Baseball Little Good.

Excelsior Springs, Mo., March 28.—
Catcher John G. Kling, formerly a member of the Chicago National League baseball club, will be penalized, but reinstated into organized baseball some time during the next week, but it will not be with the consent of B. B. Johnson, president of the consent of B. B. Johnson, president of the American League.

The report of the finding in the Kling case will be signed by Garry Herrmann, chairman of the National Baseball Commission, and by Thomas J. Lynch, president, of the National League, who, with Johnson, compose the commission.

"For the good of organized baseball,"
