ILLEGAL NOTICES SENT TO LONDON ELECTRIC

As a Result Company Gave No Heed to the Poles Argument.

Proper notice will be served by the city on the London Electric Company regarding their poles at once.

It has leaked out that the notices served on the company, through Engineer Van Cleave, were not legal, and that the company were in a position to avoid the bringing of the question to an issue.

However, all the legal qualifications will be considered when the next request is sent to the company to comply with the agreement.

"We will give the company every opportunity of meeting us," said Chairman Pocock. "We merely want a right-of-way for our lines. In some instances we are blocked by their poles. We want the company at little expense to themselves to remove the poles complained of. That is but reasonable, as the city should have some control of their own streets. As for poles that do not interfere with us, we do not care so much, nor is it at all likely that we will bother about them. We will be as reasonable in that regard as we possibly can be."

CHARGE OF NEGLIGENCE FILED BY THE BOARD

Architect Nutter Was Subject of Discussion at Meeting Last Night.

The charge made by Wm. O'Brien that City Architect Nutter was negligent in his duty, failed, when considered by the board of works last evening.

Mr. O'Brien stated that Mr. Nutter was asked on several occasions to inspect his high tower construction in West London, but had never done so. He considered it was Mr. Nutter's duty to protect the citizens when requested to do so.

Mr. Nutter in his explanation showed that he had summoned the contractor for a violation of the building by-law, and that the case had been adjourned on several occasions to enable the builder to comply with the law. He could not go to inspect the building at the very moment Mr. O'Brien asked him to do so.

Who is Inspector?
"What I want to know is who is to inspect buildings, Mr. Nutter or the building inspector, Mr. Graydon?" asked Ald. Tancock. Mr. Nutter gets all the blame, while we pay Mr. Graydon for doing this work."

"Mr. Graydon is building inspector, but Mr. Nutter is working under his instructions," explained the mayor.

"He gave Mr. Nutter no instructions to inspect this building," said Ald. Tancock.

"He does not need to," answered the mayor. "He merely tells him to inspect the buildings in course of construction, and he is supposed to do so."

"We had better ask Mr. Nutter not to inspect any more buildings, but allow Mr. Graydon to do the work," said Ald. Tancock.

"I move that Mr. O'Brien's communication be filed," said Ald. Saunders.

"We should exonerate Mr. Nutter," declared Ald. Tancock.

"A little criticism will not do him any harm," said Ald. Saunders. "Others have to stand it."

The letter was filed.

FATAL ACCIDENT.

New York, Oct. 21.—Two men were killed and three men thrown into a swamp and nearly drowned late last night in the first accident on the new electric line of the Pennsylvania Railroad between Harrison, N. J., and the new terminal on Manhattan Island. A construction locomotive ran down a handcar, and shot it 30 feet through the air into a swamp at the foot of the embankment on which it was standing with its crew.

SANATORIUM SUNDAY IN LOCAL CHURCHES

Claims of This Very Worthy Charity Will Be Laid Before Congregations.

Sanatorium Sunday will be celebrated on Sunday, Oct. 30. On that date services will be held in all the churches in the city, and the claims of this magnificent charity will be laid before the several congregations. The services will be in charge of laymen, who will occupy the pulpits in the city.

It is the purpose to raise \$11,000, if possible, to pay off the existing indebtedness on the institution.

During the coming week the members of nearly every church in the city will receive an illustrated report of the work being done at the sanatorium and it will undoubtedly be an eloquent plea for the institution.

An attempt will be made to interest the children of the schools in the work, and a special appeal will be made to them. The methods are now under consideration.

A meeting will be held on Saturday night to arrange for speakers for this Sunday, and place them in the different churches.

We should be able to pay off the debt in one Sunday, said Rev. Mr. Inkster, who is in charge of the arrangements. "It will be a great honor to the city churches if this is brought about."



The Glasgow Choir.

A good-sized and appreciative audience greeted the Glasgow Select Choir, who last night presented a Scottish concert in the Grand, under the auspices of St. Andrew's Society. Twenty well-trained voices sang the songs of bonny Scotland, and carried their listeners back to her heathered hills, so dear to the Scottish heart.

The opening number was the part song, "Pater Noster," by Hae, the inspiring and martial strains of which thrilled the audience. All these part songs were good, notably "The Barrin' of the Door," by Cullen, "Patterin' the Macgregor's Gathering," and Hume's "Afton Water." The popular favor, with which "Annie Laurie" was met, called forth "The Tinkling Chorus" as an encore, which convulsed everyone with laughter. The choir's "Laughing Gypsies," given by Messrs. Wallace, Kerr and Johnson, was irresistibly funny, and their encore, "The Wastie," was greeted with mirthful appreciation, and "The Wedding of Shon McLean," rendered by the male voices alone, delighted everyone.

Of a more thoughtful nature was Elgar's pretty serenade, "Stars of the Summer Night," Macfarren's coronach, "The Gairn (Lady of the Lake), and the lament, "Bonnie George Campbell," were sung with great feeling.

"Ye Banks and Braes of Bonny Doon" was given as an encore to the quart by Miss Scott and Foster. "We'll Ma the Keel Row," "We'll Ma the Hundred Pipers," was a stirring and well presented part-song. The deep bass voice of Mr. James Johnson with its pleasant, low, mellow tone, sang the rendering of "The Diver," and the encore "Rocked in the Cradle of the Deep."

Miss Barbara Foster's fine contralto voice touched a responsive chord in the hearts of her listeners with her exceptional rendering of Pinsuti's "The Old Country," and "My Ain Folk." Miss Jeanie E. Scott, soprano, sang "The Flowers of the Forest" with a superb tone of voice, and answered to an encore with "The Blue Bells of Scotland." Miss Scott's voice also showed to advantage in the solo part of "Now Tramp" (Roy Roy). "Smile Again, My Bonnie Lassie," an unusually pretty song, was rather well presented by Peter Kerr and Mr. H. G. Cross.

Mr. George Taggart is a capable musical director, and the accompaniments were effectively played by Mr. H. G. Cross.

All in all, the excellence of the programme was well sustained throughout, and should the Glasgow Select Choir return to London another season, they may be assured in advance of a very favorable reception.
