Captain Wolley and the German Bogy.
To the Editor of The Advertiser:
With your permission I desire to point out some of the misstatements, inconsistencies and absurdities which characterized the address of Captain Wolley before the Canadian Club the other day.

In his glorification of the greatness of Britain he seemed to think it necessary to slander other nations. He declared that while Great Britain had never exploited her provincial possessions, every other nation had exploited theirs. Now, there would seem to be absolutely no justification for such a charge, as against the United States, or France, or Denmark, or Holland. The redoubtable captain seemed to be reminded of an ancient commandment warning us against bearing false witness against our neighbors.

Again, referring to the colonial possessions of Britain, Captain Wolley said that "we have what Germany wants and Germany is loading her guns to get it." The captain ought to know whether this is true or not before speaking so positively regarding it. But he does not know, and it is only a mark of his imperialistic arrogance to assert it. With the most powerful army in Europe, Germany has put it to no aggressive use for forty years; how then is anyone justified in asserting that she would at once become aggressive when she constructs a powerful navy?

Captain Wolley declares that the German fleet is not equipped for distant voyages and that this means that Germany intends to attack Britain. But the Germans say that their fleet is intended to defend their coast cities and merchant shipping—an explanation that is at least quite as reasonable as that of Captain Wolley. And it is a principle of British fair play when a man is charged with a serious crime to give him the benefit of a doubt. That is precisely what Captain Wolley and his kind will not do, though they charge Germany with the intention of committing the most awful of all crimes—the wholesale butchery of an innocent people.

Captain Wolley says that a sure sign that Germany intends to attack Britain is that she is building a navy with borrowed money. Then in the next breath he advises that the British Empire borrow five hundred million dollars to build a navy for defence. Now, if Britain could borrow money for a fleet without being justly charged with aggressive designs, surely the same innocent intention should be allowed to Germany. But consistency and reasonableness are not to be looked for in imperialistic arguments.

GERMANY WILL BACK UP TURKEY

In Her Resistance to the Dividing of Persia By Russia and England.

TURKS ARE PREPARING

If War Starts With Russia, England Will Be Sure To Be Involved, It Is Said.

Constantinople, Nov. 7.—Turkey is so busily engaged in concentrating troops on the Persian frontier that her troubles with Greece have been temporarily put aside. There are even reports current here that the Sultan's cavalry has crossed into Persia. These reports are unconfirmed, but there is no question that Turkey will resist the plan of England and Russia to divide the Shah's kingdom between them. Dispatches received here indicate that the scene of yesterday's fight between British and Persians was at Birlis, instead of at Lingah, as was reported from Teheran. The engagement was between a force of marines from the British cruiser Prosperine and a body of Persians engaged in smuggling in arms to be used against the English.

Cables from London say news agencies there have endeavored to discredit the story by the statement that it was fought in Baluchistan. The story is credited to British cables here. Thought it is positively denied at the foreign office here, there is no doubt that in any move she may make, Germany will have the moral support of Turkey, if not armed assistance. The Turks are preparing for an active campaign.

It is for war with Russia at first that the Turks are laying their plans, though it is believed that if war is started, England is sure to be involved.

CHINESE REFORMS DUE TO EMPEROR

Consul-General at Ottawa Reviews Progress Made by Celestial Empire.

Ottawa, Nov. 7.—The movement for progressive and representative government in China was discussed today by Dr. Wang Sui Yuen, imperial consul-general for China, who recently arrived at Ottawa. Dr. Wang has been two years away from China, having been consul at Nagasaki, Japan, before coming here, but he is very much au courant with developments in his native land.

Questioned with reference to the imperial edict for cutting off queues, the consul said that his advisers were of the opinion that the movement has not yet attained its end, though it is in a fair way to do so.

"The reason for it," he said, "is simple enough. It has been suggested by many of the highest officers of the empire who desire that Chinese, in appearance, shall not be out of uniformity with other civilized people."

There is no reason, he said, why our hair long while the rest of the world cuts it. More than that, the queue is an inconvenience.

Parliament No New Thing.
Asked if he was in favor of a parliamentary government in China, Dr. Wang stated that in ancient times there was such an institution, but that it had been out of vogue for many years.

"The edict ordering the establishment of a parliament at Peking is what corresponds to our legislative," he observed, "is another evidence of that progressive development which is going on in China. The parliament at Peking will be similar in way to that at Ottawa. It will be Federal in its jurisdiction. Then in each province there will be a provincial parliament. The reforms in progress are largely the outgrowth of suggestions by the late Emperor Kwang Hsu.

Chinese colonies throughout the world are given the right to elect members of Provincial houses, and most of the Chinamen in Eastern Canada are Cantonese they will be represented in the parliament at Canton by Hum Gwah, of Ottawa, who was recently elected. The method of choice in China, as elsewhere, will be by vote. The legislation of the provinces will be subject to the consent of the governors, this being an essential.

"Things are looking up in China. More attention is being paid to the education of the masses, as well as to industrial development. China is at peace with Japan, and though I would not say the old feeling has died out, the official relationships of the two Governments are friendly. There is more of more railway communication between the two countries, how, however, the different views, however, the forward movement is indicated by the progressive Government that is proposed."

reach out and grasp the bow. The three men were dashed about by the waves, and Suisse again had a narrow escape by losing his hold, but finally gaining it again. For twenty minutes the three men were in the water before being rescued by the occupants of the other boat. The officer and Johns were helped in, while Suisse was towed behind until the shore was reached. Upon landing safely, the prisoners were brought to Sarnia.

Other Man's Story.
"I did all I could to save the detective while I maintained possession of the boat in the water, and did not in any way resist arrest," said Johns, after arriving in Sarnia. "I am a married man and have five children at home in St. Clair. This certainly is a dear bit of sport, but I've had all I ever want to see again."

Suisse has a wife and two children in St. Clair. He lived in St. Clair up to last spring, when he left to live in Sarnia.

"I struck the detective with the oar with the hope of stunning him, and rowing to shore, where we could leave him and make good our escape," he said. "It was a wild idea, and I am sorry. He is a decent fellow, too, but I used the flat side of the oar only to stun him. He would have shown me in the boat had I not grabbed him immediately he reached for his revolver. My only salvation was to try and hold him, but it was all done so quickly, and we were in the water before I had time to realize what had happened. I made an awful mistake, and deserve all I get. The detective would never have been saved had he not kept shouting under the water, and thereby kept himself afloat. I was nearly gone twice, but worked desperately to keep up."

The prisoners were taken to the lockup, where their clothes were dried, before being taken to the castle. A good-sized lump on Detective Acton's head is the only after-effects. One of the guns sank in the river.

Heavily Fined.

Simon E. Baldwin, the Democratic nominee for governor of Connecticut, said today:

"I have asked ex-President Roosevelt to retract a statement which he made in a speech in New Hampshire as to my holding a certain view on the reciprocity treaty with Canada. He made the statement in the form in which it was reported by the stenographer, and widely published. He also, if I understand his letter of Nov. 2, has written me that the statement, if made, was true."

"I shall waste no more words upon him, but I intend when I have leisure to attend to it, to bring suit on account of his making the statement, which I have no doubt was in fact correctly reported."

"I should have been better pleased if he had made a frank retraction. As he has refused to do this I regard it as my duty to bring him to justice."

At Chicago.
Chicago, Nov. 7.—The campaign in this state will come to a close tonight with final meetings in the principal cities and towns, and round-up of party workers.

In some of the congressional districts in Chicago heated contests are expected and today both sides claim victory.

Taft Anxious.
Washington, Nov. 7.—President Taft and friends of the Administration are looking forward with keen anxiety to the results of Tuesday's elections.

They believe the President's political future will depend largely upon the outcome. Mr. Taft's advisers acknowledge that if the Republicans are badly beaten in his own state and the House goes that will seriously handicap efforts to make the President the party leader again in 1912.

They do not believe, however, that a Republican defeat in New York State will in any way reflect upon the Taft administration. Issues there are too clearly drawn on Roosevelt and the things he stands for in other words, the President himself has deliberately set forward the issue that the election is to be either an endorsement or a repudiation of the Taft Administration, and if Governor Harmon carries the day the Democrats and the President's enemies within his own party will make the most of the event.

Governors will be chosen in 28 states and in 20 states legislatures will be elected that will be called on to fill vacancies in the United States Senate caused by expiring terms.

Taft Will Vote.
Washington, Nov. 7.—President Taft will leave Washington this afternoon for Cincinnati, where he will vote tomorrow. Leaving Cincinnati Tuesday afternoon, the President will receive election returns at various points en route to Washington.

At Detroit.
Detroit, Nov. 7.—News from the Michigan Democratic headquarters is that the voters believe they will elect three congressmen from this state—in the first, fifth and sixth districts. They admit the vote will be close. The Republican ticket is expected to carry.

MANY LOBBYISTS SENT TO OTTAWA
Will Watch Closely the Negotiations For Canadian-American Reciprocity Treaty.

Ottawa, Nov. 7.—The arrival of Henry M. Hoyt, solicitor of the department of state of the United States, and Charles M. Pepper, from Washington, for the purpose of negotiating a reciprocity treaty with Canada, has been followed by an advance guard of special representatives of many interests likely to be affected by the conclusion of a treaty. Foremost among these is a small army of promoters of new Canadian paper mills, enterprises and railway promoters having "paper" charters for projected railways, which, if built, would become the owners of large tracts of timber lands granted to them by way of subsidies for new railway construction and in turn offered as a desirable acquisition to prospective builders of paper mills in Canada.

Won't Talk.
Messrs. Pepper and Hoyt refuse to be quoted as to the details of their work here, but they are representatives of the Canadian department of finance realize that they will have all kinds of interests to meet.

The situation here now is much the same as at Washington when a tariff bill is before the committee of progress for discussion. Representatives of United States paper makers are flocking into Ottawa, and the reciprocity committee's advisers are in evidence on every hand. John Norris of the American Newspaper Publishers' Association is here and will remain for some time. Canadian manufacturers are loudly objecting to any sort of reciprocity, while from the Canadian west comes a distinct demand for a lowering of duties on American-made agricultural machinery.

The commissioners sent from Washington have only been here two days, and thus far their activities have been confined largely to the performance of official and social duties. The real work begins tomorrow. The commissioners have brought a complete clerical force with them and it is understood that their work will last for many weeks. Their preliminary work, it was stated today, The Advertiser correspondent, would be directed to providing material for the expected message from President Taft to congress in December on the subject of reciprocal trade relations with Canada, and the necessity of a treaty embodying the president's views.

No attempt will be seriously made to have the prohibition on the export of pulpwood cut from crown lands in the Province of Quebec, repealed. The measure was adopted by Province of Quebec, and applies only to land in Quebec, and the repeal of that law could not be effected by means of a treaty, as Quebec has sole jurisdiction of its public domain. A matter might deal with a general prohibition by the Dominion Government of such export, but as no such law exists, but is only advocated by a few.

ONE PERISHED
Woman Found Dead Since Brandon Fire and Three Are Missing.

Brandon, Nov. 6.—At least one life is known to have been lost as a result of the fire at the Insane asylum on Friday night. Mrs. Charles Hanning of Leithridge, Alta., wandered away during the excitement and her body was found on Saturday afternoon by a party of searchers near Lake Percy. She had perished from exposure, and the body being still warm when found, she must have suffered from being lying down to die. Of the thirty men who were missing on Saturday morning all have been accounted for but three, and as these were strong and in good health, it is believed they will turn up all right.

APPEAL FOR FEDERENKO
Organized Labor Asks for His Liberty.

Toronto, Nov. 7.—"Organized labor throughout Canada demands that Savva Federenko shall go free. This was the refrain of several impassioned speeches pitched in a frenzied key at a meeting held at the Labor Temple yesterday afternoon to protest against the extradition of Federenko, the Russian revolutionary who is under arrest in Winnipeg on charges preferred by the Government of the Czar, and whose case is now under advisement by the Minister of Justice. About one hundred and fifty members of the local labor and socialist parties, the foreign element being strongly represented, assembled to hear Delbert Hoop, of the Winnipeg Trades Council, acting on behalf of the Russian Defence League, make a plea for moral and financial support of the movement which has been started to obtain Federenko's release.
