

NEARLY KILLED BY

Shooting Reported From the

ployee of the British Canadian Power Company, which supplies compressed air for the mines in Cobalt, was shot twice and nearly killed at the company's power

and nearly killed at the company's power plant on the Matabitchouan River this afternoon. The shooting was done, it is alleged, by A. Landgridge, another employee of the company, who is said to have fired two shots which took effect above Craig's heart.

The power plant is seven or eight miles from Cobalt, and it is necessary to go north to Haileybury, and thence down Lake Timiskaming by boat, to get up the river to the plant, thus making the distance several miles longer. A telephone message brought the news of the shooting to Cobalt, and the informant stated that Landgridge was being held for the arrival of the police. Provincial Constable Jack MacKay and Dr. Colbeck, of Haileybury, were sent to the scene in a launch chartered by the company.

Owing to the fact that the plant is so isolated details of the shooting received so far are very meagre.

ONTARIO ALLIANCE PLANS CAMPAIGN

Local Option Contests May Be Held in Seventy-Five Municipalities.

FIELD WORK ARRANGED Middlesex and Longon Among Places Where Meetings Will Be Held.

Toronto, Sept. 5.—At a meeting of the executive committee of the Ontario branch of the Dominion Alliance, held yesterday at the exhibition grounds, it was reported that in a'l probability local option contests would be conducted in about 75 Ontario municipalities this fall. The report showed that there were 260 places in the province in which voting on the question of local option might take place, but in many of them it was impossible to organize campaigns. It is possible that there will be contests for the repeal of local option in over 200 places this year, according to the report, but the officials anticipate that in fully to per cent of these no effort will be made to have the law repealed. Rev. Dr. J. H. Hazelwood presented the report of campaign committee, showing that the field work of the alliance for the en tire fall had been marred out, covering the cities of Toronto and Hamilton, and 19 counties, as follows: New Ontario, Peel, Kent and Dundas, Essex, Prince Edward, Perth, Welland, Simcoe, Lamb-

ton, Huron, Stormont, Glengarry, Prescott and Russell, Victoria and Haliburton, Haldimand, Bruce, Toronto, Middle sex and London. Law Enforcement.

Controller J. O. McCarthy introduced the matter of law enforcement, and started a lively discussion, which brought out the fact that the whole question of getting good results from local ontion bylaws lav in securing adequate enforcement. Steps will be taken at once to

bring pressure to bear upon local license inspectors throughout the province to insure better results. A report on publication work was presented by Mr. J. S. Robertson, showing that the circulation of the official organ of the alliance had increased substantially, and that arrangements had been made for special campaign editions to assist in the local option contests, Campaign buttons, posters and leaflets will also be issued.

The physicians decided then that this method was absolutely necessary in order to save their lives.

The viceroy points out that the prisoners can terminate the pump feeding as soon as they like, but if they persist in refusing food the only alternatives outside of pump feeding are to allow them to die or release them, and the authorities are doing the only possible thing to prevent their death.
