# THE PRESBYTERIANS

Expert To Be Engaged to Devote Entire Time to the Management.

BUDGET FOR THIS YEAR

Million Dollars Required, and Still More Is Expected For Next Year.

Toronto, July 10. — The finance board of the Presbyterian Church board of the Presbyterian Church in Canada at its first session, which lasted all day yesterday, made three decisions which will be of considerable importance to the church at large. "The board intends, as soon as the way is clear, to secure the services of a man who will devote his whole time to the executive work of the church, and who will be to a certain extent its financial head," to a certain extent its financial head," said Rev. Dr. W. G. Wallace, convener of the board. It was also decided to take over the existing machinery put in operation by the old committee on systematic benevolence, which the new board is replacing, so far as the raising of finances for the present are concerned. This machinery is in the nature of synodical and presbyterial committees on systematic giving throughout the Dominon, with the exception of the Maritime Provinces. The finance board also decided to co-operate with the Pres-byterian section of the laymen's missionary movment regarding the raising of finances. A million dollars is this year's budget, and next year the board expects to be confronted with another increase of \$200,000.

Yesterday's session was filled with a general discussion of the proposed work of the board, its policy, and the methods to be adopted. No decisions, however, were made, but an executive committee was appointed with tive committee was appointed, with power to act, to meet and consider the Dr. Wallace is convener of this committee, and the other members are Hon. W. A. Charlton, Mr. Alexander Laird, Mr. T. Findlay, and Mr. J. A. Paterson, K. C., of Toronto; Mr. J. Rodger, of Montreal, and Mr. E. Brown, of Winnipeg. "Catholic" Replies to "Common Sense."

With fierce pistol fight with three officers. your permission I shall endeavor briefly, to shatter his last stronghold. Your correspondent's quibbling about Magna Charta, is, in view of his for-

mer rabid statements about same, un-worthy of any further notice. Your readers have the whole correspondence With them I leave the verdict. As to his attempt to charge Catholicism with the absolutist theories of Cardinal Wolsey (who by the way was one of the ablest ministers that England ever had) reference to page 326 of his authority, Green, will show him that "the clergy put themselves in the front rank of resistance and preached from every pulpit that the commission was con-trary to the liberties of the realm." I suppose "Common Sense" will evade this, however, by stating that they "had a particular axe to grind." Fine argument, that, with wide applications.

Father Tobin was very right in attributing Habeas Corpus to Catholicages. This celebrated feature of our constitution was embodied in a famous clause of the Great Charter of 1215. The Act of 1679 simply provided against any evasion of the same.
One point of "Common Sense" attack alone remains. He asks me to name a Catholic state of any magnitude which had gone ahead constitutionally as the

mother of parliaments subsequent to 1500. As I have proved that the outstanding features of our rights as Englisr freemen are largely Catholic in origin, I am puzzled to see wherein such an admission could possibly benefit your correspondent. Or does he think to establish some relationship between modern political freedom and the great restriction of the sixteenth century? revolution of the sixteenth century? Vain hope. His line of argument militates heavily against the system of which he is the zealous apologist. Before Luther, Europe was progressing steadily in the direction of a safe, sure and rational liberty. Afterward the royal theologian, James I., could de-clare that "God has appointed the king or ruler absolute master, and all priv-ileges which co-legislative bodies enjoy are pure concessions proceeding from the king's bounty." When a Catholic the king's bounty." When a Catholic preacher in Catholic Spain preaching before Philip II. proclaimed a similar before Philip II. proclaimed to the indoctrine, he was denounced to the inquisition and compelled to make publice recantation before the king.

"Common Sense" is right. The wave of absolutism which the Catholic Church had so successfully fought against for aggs great care. against for ages, swept over Europe again in the sixteenth century with a fury that threatened to engulf every vestige of freedom that had been won in the past 1,500 years. Nowhere did absolutism triumph more successfully there in these countries where the rich countrie than in those countries where the vic-ory over Catholicism was most complete, to wit: Denmark, Sweden, Norway and Germany. No Catholic state, perhaps, ever reached such a low eb in constitutional safeguards as these four states, though the great politico-religious movement of the sixteenth century created sad havoc with their traditional liberties, and so profoundly affected the current of civil and politi-cal freedom that they have never wholly recovered.
