

MILITANTS WHIP PREMIER ASQUITH AND HIS DAUGHTER

Party Ran Into Suffragette Ambush While Motoring Near Edinburgh.

NEITHER BADLY INJURED

Women Hurried Away Before Police Could Arrive and Arrest Them.

Edinburgh, Scotland, Nov. 1.—Premier Asquith was attacked today by militant suffragettes armed with dog whips, while he was driving near Stirling in an automobile, accompanied by his daughter, Miss Violet Asquith, and Sir John Graham, a Scottish justice of the peace.

The automobile was passing through the village of Plein, five miles from Falkirk, when it ran into a suffragette ambush. The "wild women," as they are called here, under cover of a shower of papers, rushed at the car and belabored the premier and his companions. They then as suddenly disappeared before the police had reached the scene.

The victims of the outrage were more frightened than hurt.

POLICE POWERLESS TO QUELL RIOTING AT INDIANAPOLIS

Mob Held Up Street Cars and Took Crews From Them.

SYSTEM WAS PARALYZED

Five Hundred Employees of the Line Are Out On Strike.

Indianapolis, Ind., Nov. 1.—Rioting in the street, the majority of the men and women who were out on strike, broke out at the corner of Illinois and Washington streets, in the heart of the business section, shortly before 9 o'clock this morning. Cars were held up and trolley ropes cut.

A block away, at Washington street and Capital avenue, near the State House, the mobman and conductor were taken from a car, which was left standing in the middle of the street.

The police force in the downtown section seemed unable to cope with the strikers and hundreds of their friends. The strikers blocked the tracks and the cars could get through only when the police would go ahead of the cars and clear the way. The strike leaders hurled invectives at the car crews, and demanded that they join the strike.

Few persons patronized the cars this morning, the majority of the men and women who were out on strike. Many of the cars had to be re-routed through the downtown district to avoid greased rails.

Scheduled Paralyzed.

While some cars are being operated on all lines, nothing like the regular schedule is being maintained.

Although the street railway officials declare that many of the men and women who ran their cars to the barns last night reported for duty again today, and that only about 10 per cent of the men are out, the strike leaders contend there are 500 out on strike.

Mails Must Go.

William T. Fletcher, postoffice inspector, issued a statement today, in which he declared that the collection of the mails from sub-stations by the street car company, which is under contract to the Government, was interfered with, the Government would begin an investigation. The statement declared the mails must be collected on regular time.

After an hour or more of rioting in the centre of the business section, the mounted police were called out and drove the crowd away from the cars. An attempt was made to pull one of the mounted officers from his horse, but he pulled his mount around and rode down the crowd.

KITTY GORDON ILL COLLAPSES IN WEST

Actress Played Here in "The Enchantress" Last Season.

Los Angeles, Nov. 1.—Kitty Gordon, the English actress, and leading woman in the "Enchantress" company, collapsed at the Majestic Theatre last night. The curtain was hastily run down and restoratives applied, but Miss Gordon did not rally sufficiently to continue the performance.

The audience was dismissed, and the theatre manager announced later that, owing to the serious condition of the comedienne, they would cancel the remaining presentations of the "Enchantress" here.

Miss Gordon played London last season in the "Enchantress."

FOUR MEET DEATH, MANY BADLY HURT OVER HALLOWEEN

Police Seek Unknown Motorcyclist Who Fired Into Crowd Killing Two.

Two Widows Drop Dead of Heart Failure While Attending Party.

Lancaster, Pa., Nov. 1.—The police are today seeking an unknown rider of a motorcycle who sped through Lancaster and Williamstown late last night, discharging a revolver wildly among Halloween crowds, and who is believed to be responsible for the killing of two persons.

One of the victims is 16-year-old Ivan Graeff, who was with a crowd of other boys at Williamstown when the cyclist passed the group, and without provocation fired three shots from a revolver. One of the bullets struck Graeff in the temple and he died instantly.

Found Lying Dead.

The other victim was M. Collama, an itinerant fruit merchant, whose body was found along the roadside near the southern limits of this city. It was at first assumed that Collama had fallen from his wagon, and broken his neck, but an undertaker later discovered that the man had been shot in the right shoulder and that death had been caused by an internal hemorrhage. It is believed the shooting same course as that on which the fruit merchant was innocently driving.

WIDOWS DROP DEAD.

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 1.—Mrs. Hilda Ewart, 52, and her daughter, Mrs. Alma Stensgren, 32, both widows, died of heart disease within 30 minutes last night, the latter at a Halloween party, and the former while on her way to join her daughter when informed of her illness.

The daughter died within a half hour after being taken ill. Her mother was notified of her illness, and dropped dead on a street corner. The body was found by a policeman.

LAD WAS ELECTROCUTED.

Chicago, Nov. 1.—Two boys are dead as the result of Halloween pranks last night. While trying to pull down an arc light Morgan Campbell, aged 15, came in contact with a charged wire and was instantly electrocuted.

Tomaso Lantini died in a hospital from injuries sustained when he was knocked down by a fire department wagon which was answering a false alarm some blocks away.

**PREMIER RETURNED
BY GOOD MAJORITY**

Government Is Safe After Hot Election in Newfoundland.

St. John's, Nfld., Nov. 1.—Sir Edward Morris, premier of Newfoundland, was returned to the Colonial Legislature in the elections of Thursday, his opponents conceded today. Premier Morris' two colleagues in St. John's West district also were returned. Their majorities, as conceded by Opposition leaders, average about 1,000 each, or more than three times the majorities of the government candidates in the last election.

MRS. PANKHURST AND GOMPERS WILL BE PARTNERS AT A DANCE

Tonight the British militant and Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, will lead the grand march at a Halloween dance to be given by the Women's Trade Union League.

DOCTORS PLEDGED TO SECURE ROADS TO THE HOSPITAL

STROME, ALTA., FIRE-SWEPT

The Business Section Wiped Out When Kerosene Lamp Was Accidentally Upset.

HELP FROM NEIGHBORS

Strome, Alta., Nov. 1.—At an early hour today, the whole business section of this town was threatened with destruction by fire, and the Camrose fire department was being rushed to the assistance of the local men on a special train.

A bookkeeper, working late, upset a kerosene lamp in Douglas Bros.' departmental store, which in a few minutes was a mass of flames. The whole town turned out to fight the fire, which nevertheless spread to E. H. Hatman's drug store, Miss B. C. Hite's millinery store, I. C. Freeman's poolroom and restaurant, and consumed them.

The latest report was not hopeful of saving much of the business section. Strome is sixty miles east of Wetaskiwin on the Hardisty branch of the Canadian Pacific.

Weather Notes.

ALDERMEN CONVERTED TO MEAT INSPECTION AFTER SEEING INFECTED ANIMALS

Need For Compulsory Examination Plainly Demonstrated by the Board of Health Members, Who Show Diseased Carcasses to Deputation—Hogs Affected With Pyaemia Dangerous for Consumption or Handling.

CAMPAIGN OF EDUCATION TO HAVE RESULTS

There are five aldermen of the city council at least who are strong advocates of compulsory Government inspection of all meats sold in the city limits. It may be that their advocacy of the inspection system does not date back very far, but after having seen the Government inspectors at work on Friday afternoon their conversion was assured.

Inspect All Meats.

The inspection was part of the educational campaign being waged by the board of health. That it was successful was clearly demonstrated by the statements made by the members of the party after they had seen just what Government inspection really meant, and what it saved the consumer. For some time the board of health has been working to interest the council in the question of meat inspection.

Asked for Bylaw.

Last week it adopted a resolution, on motion of Chairman Dr. F. L. Burdon, asking the city council to pass a bylaw that will enable the board of health to demand that all meats sold in London be properly inspected by a Government inspector, and to prohibit the sale of any meat within the city limits that does not bear the Government stamp. The council referred the question to No. 3 committee (the market committee), and Friday's inspection was the result. It is expected that the resolution asked for by the board will be submitted to the council at once.

The Personnel of the Party.

In the party that inspected the plant of the Dominion Abattoir Company on Friday were: Chairman G. E. Rose, and Ald. E. Stein and Frank

White, of No. 3 committee; Ald. J. H. Saunders and Ald. William Spittal, ex-advocates of compulsory Government inspection of all meats sold in the city limits. Building Inspector A. M. Piper, Veterinary Officer C. S. Tamin of the board of health, Dr. J. Gowan, Medical Health Officer T. V. Hutchinson and Dr. F. L. Burdon.

A Convincing Exhibit.

At the abattoir they were shown four condemned carcasses. Three were in a terrible state from tuberculosis, one being affected with pyaemia (blood-poisoning) of the lungs, over a gallon of pus being contained in the lungs of the animal.

Could Be Doctored.

The statement was made that in the hands of a skilful butcher it would be possible to "doctor" the beef so that no trace of the infection would be left.

As to cost of killing, it was found that any abattoir would kill and dress the beef as cheaply as it could be done by the butchers themselves. Condemned carcasses were sent immediately to the fertilizer works, where they were destroyed.

Local Infection.

In the cases of local infection only, the affected parts were removed and destroyed, while the edible portions of the meat were retained. In the case of hogs that were found to be partially affected only, the owners would be allowed to make lard out of the remaining portions, but they would have to be boiled for six hours at a temperature of 250 degrees so that all tuberculosis germs would be destroyed. It was only in animals where the neck glands alone were affected that such procedure was allowed. Where any of the body glands were affected the animal was condemned entirely.

After seeing with their own eyes what Government inspection saved the people of London from eating, the members of the council expressed their desire to see that it was enforced on all meats.

**MR. ARTHUR E. HOURS
SUCCEUMBS SUDDENLY**

Prominent Manufacturer Had Built Up Large Industry in Twenty Years.

Kiev, Russia, Nov. 1.—The strain of the long trial is beginning to tell on Mendel Beliss, the prisoner accused of the murder of Andrew Yushinsky in March, 1911. At today's hearing he fainted in court and the trial was adjourned.

One of the principal medical experts, Dr. Bekhtereff, asserted on the witness stand that the murder was the work of alcoholics or epileptics, and that it was impossible to attribute a religious character to the crime.

BEAVERS NEAR OTTAWA

Colony of Twenty Found Near New Rifle Ranges.

Ottawa, Nov. 1.—A colony of about twenty beavers have been found near the new Connaught rifle ranges about twelve miles from Ottawa. The animals are building a dam in Constant Creek. Game Warden Loveday has taken steps to insure that they will not be molested.

A Double Danger.

It was explained to the aldermen that the great danger from the case of animals suffering from pyaemia was not only in the eating of the meat, but in its handling. This was just one of the instances pointed out, while it was shown that the maintenance of a public abattoir, where all animals would have to be killed, would work no hardship on anyone, except in the cases of the men who would purchase the diseased animals for \$10 or \$15 and who would sell it on the market for first-class beef.

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ALTERATIONS TO HOTEL.—A building permit was issued this morning to the Lloyd estate for alterations and additions to the Metropolitan Hotel building, Wellington and Dundas streets, that will cost \$14,500.
