

### GANADIANS SHOULD KNOW HISTORY OF THE COUNTRY

Interesting Address Given by Canon Tucker at St. Matthew's Church.

"Canada" was the subject which Canon Tucker, rector of St. Paul's Cathedral, chose for his address last night before the men of St. Matthew's Church. Samuel Baker, city clerk, occupied the chair. During the evening Rev. Edward Appleyard, rector of the church, announced that his Worship Mayor Graham had promised to speak on "Good Citizenship" on Thursday evening, Jan. 29.

Canon Tucker pointed out that it was important for Canadians to know some-thing of their past history, for such knowledge had a great bearing upon the prob-lems of the present. In England, he re-marked, they did not think that Canada's history amounted to anything, but it was the richest and most enthralling history to e found in any country. If anyone wished to learn the truth of that statement he had but to read Parkman.
