THE LOCAL MARKET

There was a good-sized Saturday market this morning, especially in the dairy hall, which was crowded to capacity. Prices remained the same, with the exception of potatoes, which were ten cents a bushel easier, and are now selling at 60 cents a bushel. This is a drop of 25 cents a bushel in a week. By the bag, potatoes are selling from 85 to 90 cents.

There was a good demand for pears on Thursday, which caused an advance in price of ten cents a bushel. The best varieties are selling at \$1.10 per bushel.

Over 100 loads of hay have been sold on the market this week. At the beginning of the week \$16 per ton was the top price, but towards the end, it dropped to \$15.50. There was no hay or oats offered for sale on the market this morning.

The largest supply of poultry for sale in some time made its appearance this morning. Chickens went from \$1 to \$1.50. There was a good demand. Ducks sold at \$1.25 to \$1.50 per pair. They were also in demand.

Winnipeg, Sept. 18.—Wheat prices opened 1/4c higher; oats unchanged to 1/4c lower. The market was strong for both wheat and oats, and wheat made further advances on buying by export houses and speculators. At noon wheat prices were: October, \$1.10 1/2; December, \$1.12 1/2; and May, \$1.13 1/2.

Oats for October were 49c, and December, 49c.

Farmers are inclined to hold, and this with unfavorable weather was also a factor in raising prices. Closing figures were 1 1/2c to 1 3/4c higher. Oats closed 1/4c to 1/2c higher.

The cash demand in the early hours was quiet, but later a keen inquiry for No. 3 northern developed, other grades being indifferent. Considerable sales of oats were also offered for export. Flax continues quiet. Cash grain closed: Wheat, 1 1/2c to 1 3/4c higher; oats, 1/4c to 1/2c higher; barley unchanged to 1/4c higher, and flax 1/4c lower.

Transactions on Tuesday totalled 1,249 cars, as against 1,182 cars last year, and in eight months 1,300 cars.

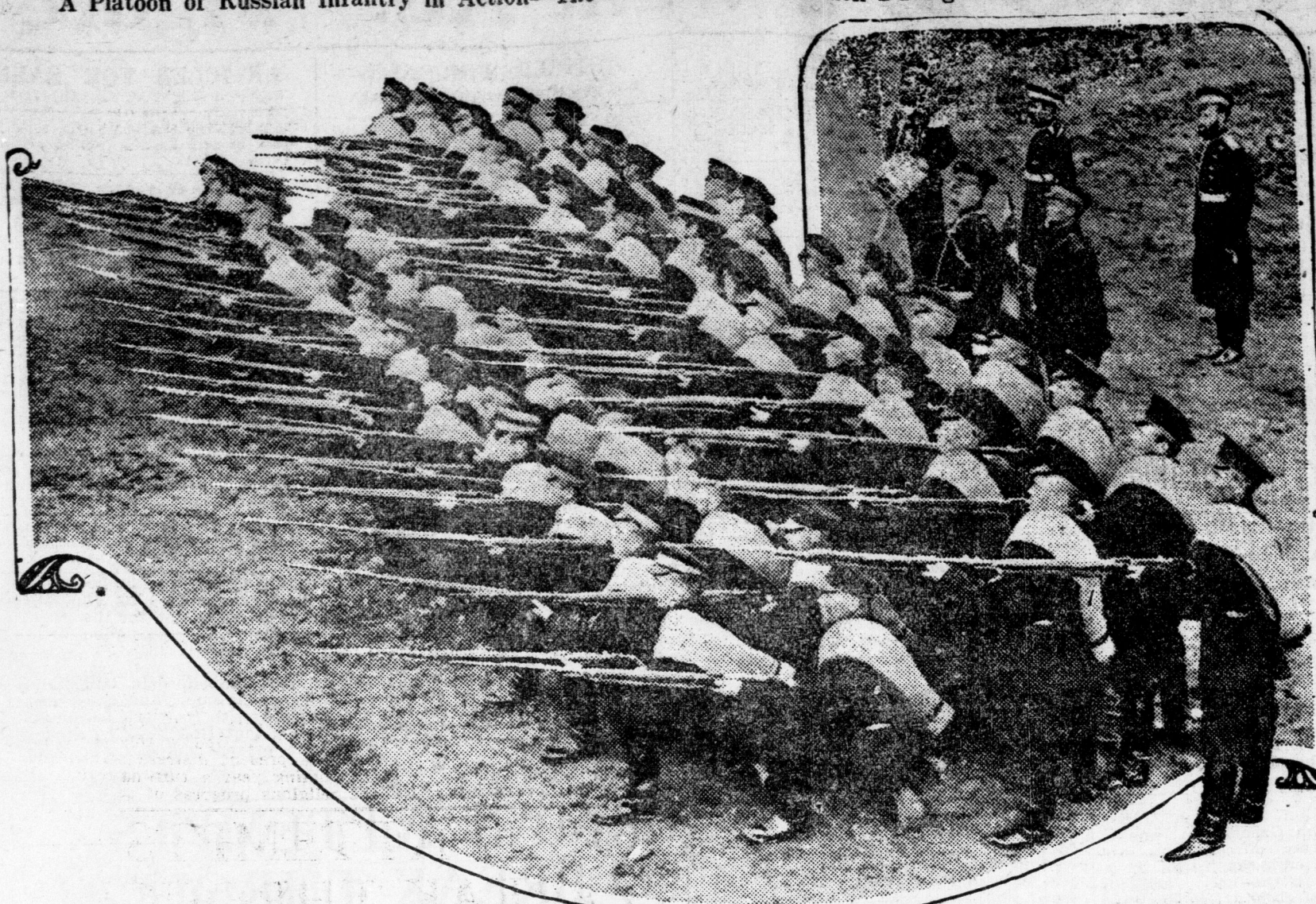

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RUSSIA WATCHING FLEET OF TURKEY

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TOWN OF RHEIMS IS SET ON FIRE

German Artillery Holds Its Ground and Bombs the Town From Its Old Forts.

London, Sept. 18.—The Paris correspondent of the Daily Mail, describing the great battle, says: "The Germans have held their ground three days, their heaviest guns hidden in the woods, and the French artillery has not yet obtained a mastery of fire over them."

"The German infantry is entrenched along the edges of woods in which the batteries are concealed. It is being attacked alternately by artillery fire and by infantry assaults, the French charges being driven home right in the heart of the woods."

"At night the Germans make counter attacks, but these have always been repulsed."

"The stronghold of the German position is the height of Nogent L'Abbesse, three miles due east of Rheims, where the Germans occupy the site of what used to be the forts of Rheims, and from there they are bombarding the town of Rheims, which was on fire in eight different places at four o'clock this (Thursday) afternoon, when I came down from the tower of the cathedral, from which I had been watching the fierce battle since morning."

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
