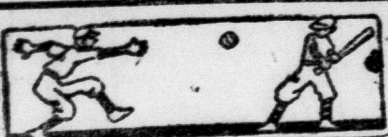

## REISLING HANDED OUT FIRST RELEASE TODAY

Pitcher Walter Hutchinson, who has so far failed to report, has had his ticket cancelled—New South-paw will be secured next week.

Warm weather greeted the London Canadian leaguers at Tecumseh Park today, and good work-outs were held both morning and afternoon. The diamond is in great shape, although a trifle soft after the heavy rain of yesterday.

Manager Reisling handed out his first release of the season today when he cancelled the transportation forwarded to Walter Hutchinson, of Nelsonville, Ohio. Hutchinson is the pitcher who is said to be a second "Rube" Waddell.

He has signed a contract but the club has been unable to locate him for the past month or so, he having departed for Florida or some other place in the Southern States. Manager Reisling decided he would not be able to use him, so he will send him his release right away.

**After Another Southpaw.**

Instead of Hutchinson, the local manager has a line on a southpaw pitcher who stands 6 feet 3 inches in height. Until he knows definitely whether he can land him, Manager Reisling will not announce his name or where he hails from. "He is recommended to me by a friend of mine who has in the past bailed from. He is recommended to me who all made good," said "Doc" this morning. "Three of the players I secured on his advice are holding positions in the big leagues today," he continued. "I have no doubt that this pitcher will make good, and I am going to make every effort to sign him up."

**Bowden Looks Good.**

The players who are already here are rounding to form nicely. Bowden and Morgan are in action for the first time today. Bowden handles himself nicely, and looks like a promising catcher. Morgan did little beyond warm up and catch fungoes in the outfield. He is the pitcher who had such a good record in the Wobley League.

**Labate Is Ambidextrous.**

In Joe Labate, the Brooklyn youngster, London has landed a player who is probably the first ambidextrous ball player that ever tried out in the

Canadian League. Labate throws equally well with his left or right hand. He pitches with his right hand and plays the infield and outfield with his left. He has good throwing power in each arm, and his work is causing a lot of comment.

The squad will be greatly increased for Monday's workouts. The rest of the players will be on hand tomorrow this evening, and probably witness the Detroit-Washington game in that city Sunday afternoon. Walter Johnson is going to perform for the Senators, and "Doc" will be right at home with his former teammates.

**Cy Will Motor Over.**

"Doc" will motor over from Detroit Sunday afternoon and evening. Cy Reidy will make the trip to London with him.

**"Cuz" Hammond Is Nursing a Badly Plumed Knee Today.**

The exhibition game between London and Ottawa to be played here next Saturday is creating interest both here and in Ottawa. It is the first game on record where two Canadian League teams met before the season opened.

As it is altogether likely that the chief struggles for the pennant will be between Ottawa and London as for the past three years, the game should give the fans a good line on the respective strengths of the two teams. Shaughnessy and his players will start training Monday at Chatham.

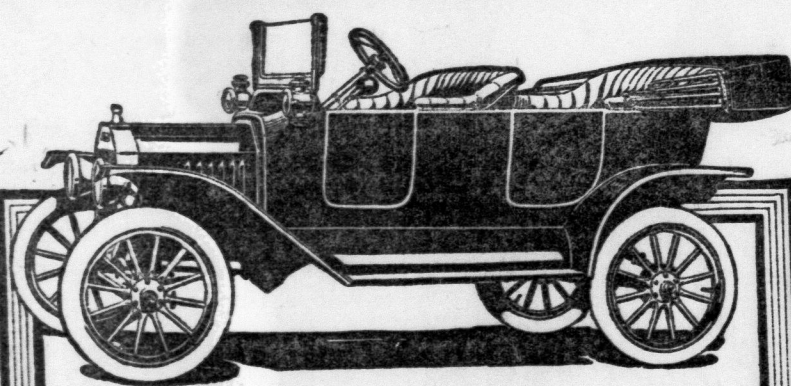

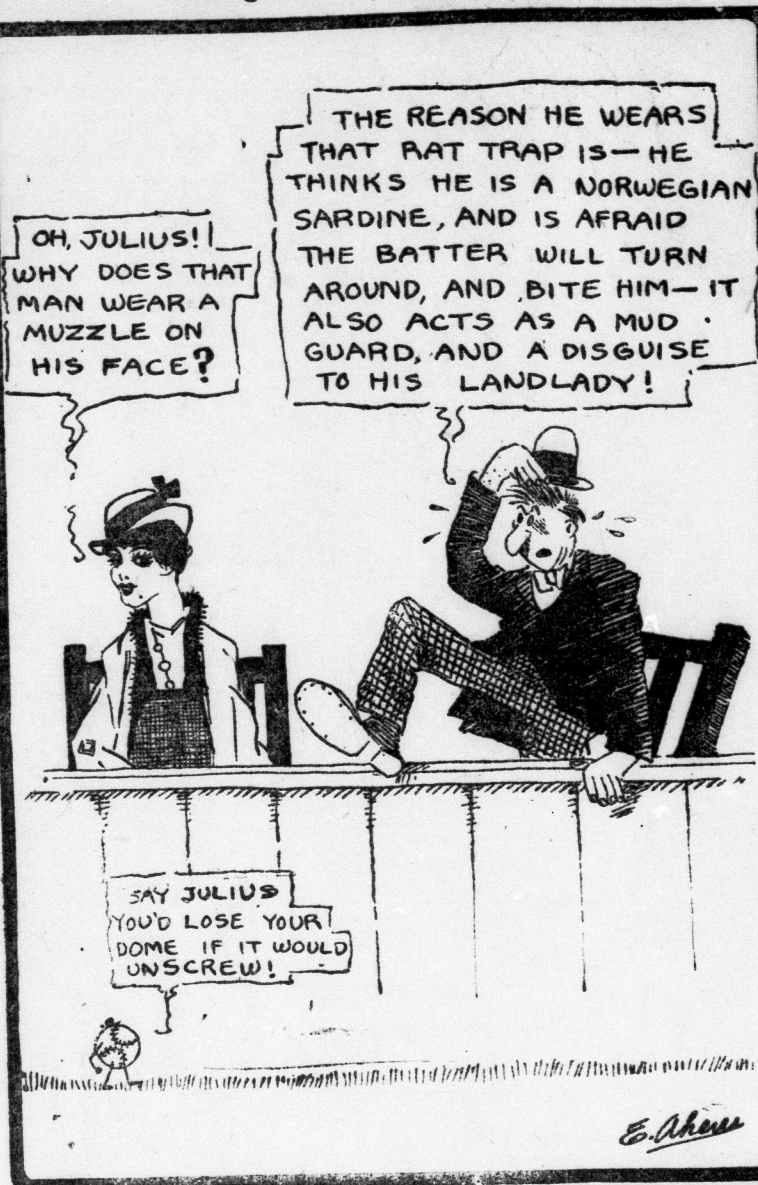

**To Sell 5,000 Shares.**

Five thousand shares, to be sold at \$25 per share, will be placed on the market for disposal among the citizens who are interested in the success of the venture. The price was placed at \$25 per share, which is a reasonable selling price attached to each stock which will be placed on the market. The directors are confident that the younger enthusiasts in the city who desired to assume a monetary interest in the organization.

A general canvass of the city will be made next Monday, when all interested will be asked to subscribe. Indorsement of the team and pledges of support were passed at a meeting of the Ministerial Alliance held tonight.
