Citizens Afforded Opportunity To View Results of Training.

The annual exhibition of students' work will be held in the Technical School next week. The building will be open to the public on Tuesday and Wednesday evenings from 7:30 to 9:30. The building and equipment of the school is well worth a visit to the school to see, and the exhibition of students' work will afford citizens who have not attended previous exhibitions an opportunity of forming some idea of the extent and quality of practical work carried on in the Technical High School, while those who have visited the exhibition of other years will see the progress that the school is making.

Every department of the school will be represented in the annual exhibition of students' work. These will include machine shop, cabinet making, carpentry, electric wiring, science of electricity, applied science, automobile work, welding, tool making, commercial art, show-card writing, mechanical and architectural draughting, wood carving, building construction, cooking, sewing, dressmaking, millinery and embroidery. Moving pictures of typical Canadian and local industries will be an added feature of the exhibition this year.

Petrolea Man Gets Belated Reward From U. S. For Indian War Services

Petrolea, March 24.—Allan Campbell, lineman in the employ of the Petrolea Hydro Commission, is reported over news he received from Washington this week.

To his next surprise he was informed that as a veteran of the American army he is entitled to a back pension of \$1,440 and \$20 a month as long as he lives.

This is how it all happened: Mr. Campbell left Canada when a young man and went to Denver. In 1885 he enlisted in the forces than being

raised to subdue the Apache Indians who were on the warpath in Arizona and New Mexico.

He served until 1890, when he received his discharge and returned to Canada. It was not until a year ago that his military career was brought back to him, when he was talking to a local man, who also served in the American army at that time.

He informed Mr. Campbell of his being entitled to a pension, and correspondence was instituted with the American government at Washington, with good results.

SIoux CITY RESIDENTS FLEEING FROM FLOOD

Ice Jam in Floyd River Creates Danger in Iowa District.

Associated Press Despatch. Sioux City, March 24.—Four hundred homes in the Sioux City "bottom" were menaced as the result of the overflow last night of the Floyd River. Residents were abandoning their homes at midnight and fleeing to the high ground.

The Floyd River, filled with back water from the Missouri, as the result of the ice goings at Sergeant Bluffs, Iowa, rose three feet in six hours. Lower floors of six buildings in the district were under water.

South of here the struggle continued between an almost immovable mass of solid ice, ten miles long, and an apparently irresistible dash of spring flood waters.

RECOMMENDS A WARRANT TO DEPORT LONDON GIRL

The arrest followed complaint to authorities by Loughrey's wife. Washington immigration authorities will act on Dr. Prentiss' recommendation. If the warrant is approved, Miss Stevenson will be sent to Glasgow, Scotland, her birthplace.

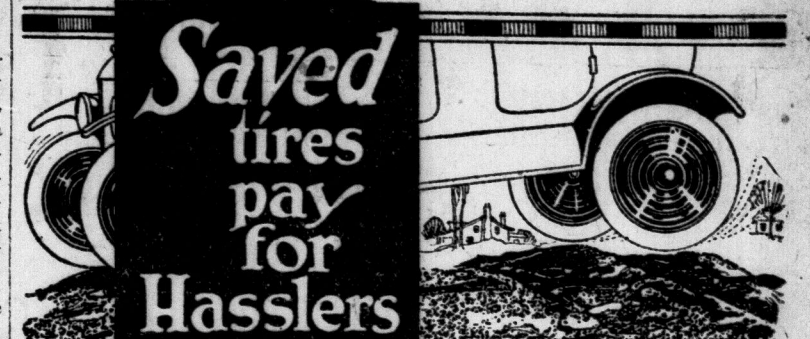
