MIDDLESEX TAX RATE WILL BE CUT TWO MILLS FOR 1925

County Council Expects Nine-Mill Rate For This Year.

\$50,000 DEBENTURES

Issue Will Take Care of Provincial Road Account Balance.

The county tax rate for Middlesex this year will likely be 9 mills, 2 mills lower than last year. The report of the estimate committee of the county council meeting yesterday afternoon at the county buildings for the June session, which contained the 9-mill recommendation, was referred to the finance committee for consideration, and will be dealt with later on in the week.

The estimates committee, which was headed by Warden Allan McPherson, Glencoe, also recommended that debentures be issued to meet the balance of the provincial road account of 1924, amounting approximately to \$50,000.

Want More Lockers.
The request of the Middlesex Bar association for additional locker accommodation in the court house, was referred to the jail committee for action.

Communications from the boiler inspector, stating that the boilers in

the court house and house of refuge, Strathroy, were in good working order, was filed.

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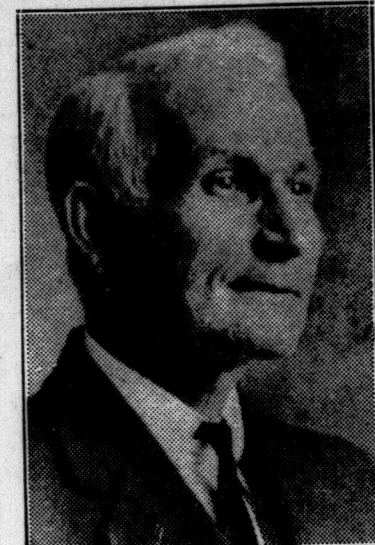

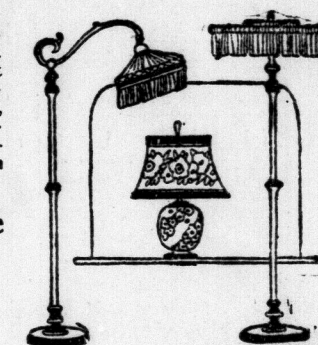

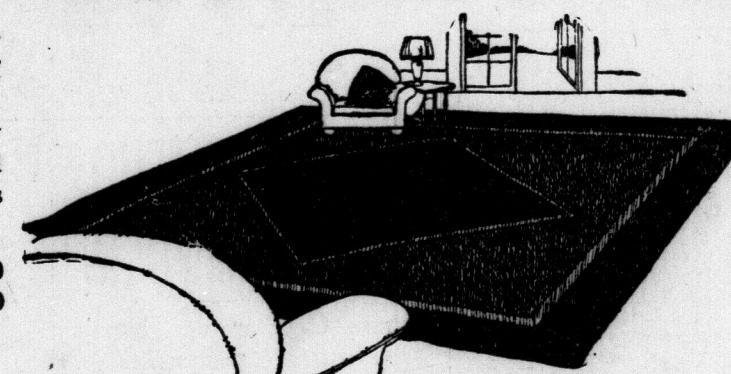

CANNED HEAT IS HOT, CAUSES TWO CASUALTIES

Chatham Party Starts in Parlor—Ends in Kitchen Antics.

Chatham, June 1.—Drinks of canned heat were responsible for an argument, which led to a fight between

two men in a local residence Saturday night, and their appearance in the city police court this morning. One of the men, Charles Coleman, pleaded guilty to a charge of being drunk, but not guilty to charges of breaking the windows in David Kenny's home, and of disorderly conduct.

Kenny, the other party to the fight encounter, which is said to have started in the parlor and finished in the kitchen a half an hour later, with the men brandishing a carving knife, pleaded not guilty of being intoxicated and of disorderly conduct. Coleman was arrested on complaint of Kenny, and the latter

was summoned to give evidence in court this morning. The story of the affair led the officials to believe that Kenny was somewhat to blame himself, and he was placed under arrest on the two charges. Both men were remanded to jail for a week.
