**Good Handyweights Sell At
\$6 to \$7.50 On Toronto
Live Stock Market.**

Toronto, Aug. 26.—Left-overs totaled 100, and cattle trade was steady at 100, mostly for slaughter, and morning good heavy weights sold at \$7.50, with exporters taking the balance at \$7.25. Cows and calves low, with prices easier. Good cows weighing at \$4 to \$5.25, with exporters taking the balance at \$4.50. Stocked calves sold at \$4 to \$5.

Cattle trade was firm at \$12 for tops; good heavy weights sold at \$12.50. Hogs steady at \$12.25 off cars for thick, medium and slab for select.

Good hams sold at \$15.50 for 14 lb. 14. Sheep were steady at \$7 for the best.

Mr. Justice Hodgins Will De-

Toronto, Aug. 26.—Mr. Justice Hodgins, at a special sitting at Osgoode hall tomorrow, will hear the case of

the dispute between sessions and congregation of St. John's church, Pittsburgh township, and the continuing Presbyterian church in Canada and others. When the case came up in weekly court on Aug. 20, Mr. Justice Logie declined to hear it, as he was a Presbyterian, and he adjourned the

matter for a week. As weekly court will be conducted by Mr. Justice Logie, a special hearing by Justice Hodgins has been arranged.

Plaintiffs, the congregation of the church, are moving for continuing of the injunction restraining the con-

tinuing Presbyterian church from interfering in any way with the church.

DRUNKENNESS SHOWS INCREASE IN ENGLAND

London, Aug. 26. Statistics of the convictions for drunkenness in England and Wales for the past year show a slight increase over the figures for the previous year, although in London there has been a decrease. Nearly 84 per cent of the total number, 79,082, were males.

There were 18 convictions for drunkenness per 10,000 of population during the past year, which represents less than half the pre-war aggregate. The increase in the number of convictions is due to increased drinking of methylated spirits, this having accounted for largely by the

being accounted for in the London portion of the statistics.

OWNER OF BEER CLAIMS ILLEGAL SEIZURE MADE

Hamilton, Aug. 26.—O. J. A. enforcement officers may be made the defendants in an action by a local man for the return of 101 cases of beer seized at Port Matland Saturday. Lawyers, representing the owner of the beer, interviewed the officers this morning.

Members of the local dry squad seized a truck to Port Maitland, seizing the beer as it was being loaded on a boat. It is claimed that they had no right to confiscate the shipment, and the owner is demanding that it be sent back to Port Maitland at the expense of the Ontario

government.

PREMIER'S OPINION.
Toronto, Aug. 26.—Premier Ferguson did not seem to take very seriously this morning the conclusions of the American prohibition delegation which has been making inquiry

The premier, when the matter was brought to his attention, was not inclined to discuss the matter at length, characterizing what was reported as "whole-clothed." He considered,

however, that in what they had stated, they had borne out the government's contention as to the non-intoxicating nature of the beverage.
