OBITUARY

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TRULY A WONDERFUL ACHIEVEMENT



Busseldorf, June 28.—One of the greatest achievements in the history of aerial navigation was accomplished when the first regular transatlantic passenger service was inaugurated by the Deutschland, the giant dirigible built after the Zeppelin model with the veteran aviator himself at the helm. The weather was perfect and the motors worked faultlessly. The average rate of forty-one miles an hour was maintained for the complete course, was approximately thirty-three miles an hour. The flight was made in three days and three nights and the distance of 3,600 miles was covered at an average rate of forty-one miles an hour. The best speed for a single hour was approximately thirty-three miles an hour.
