THE NEW YORK STRIKE.
The Prospect of a Settlement Remotely.

New York, Feb. 7.—The riot fronts and neighboring streets still presented a Sunday appearance this morning, and there was no change in the condition of affairs. Monday is usually the busiest day of the week at the Brooklyn docks, but there was no blockade of the belt-line street car today, not more than one-fourth the number of tracks, which usually block and choke South and West streets, being out. Most of the piers were open to freight traffic, but little came as compared with the anti-strike times. Few matters may have been experienced here as do as much as three or four of such men as have taken the places of the strikers, but the new men show signs of being new.

THE FISHERY QUESTION.
