THE UNITY OF THE EMPIRE

A QUESTION IN WHICH ALL BRITISH SUBJECTS ARE INTERESTED.

A Paper Read by Mr. G. J. Toker, Editor of the "Petersburg Review," at a Meeting of the Petersburg Branch of the Imperial Federation League Last Night.

PETERSBURG, Oct. 12.—A meeting of the Petersburg branch of the Imperial Federation League was held this evening. Mr. J. H. Long, principal of the collegiate institute, presiding.

According to previous arrangement, Mr. G. J. Toker, editor of the "Petersburg Review," read a paper entitled "A United Empire," dealing with the objections raised by the opponents of unity.

The paper described these objections as so many straw men, and the speaker pointed out the real difficulties of the question.

It was necessary to place the question of Imperial unity fairly before the people, so as to remove misconceptions and disseminate popular knowledge. First it was said that the Federationists advocated Imperial rule, and that this would be acceptable to neither Britain nor Canada.
