Toronto Markets.

Toronto, Sept. 5.—Receipts at the city cattle market to-day were 77 cars, with 1,100 head of cattle, 1,000 sheep and lambs, 700 hogs and 260 calves.

Trade was moderately active, and prices steady. There was very little to tempt buyers in the way of anything choice, though choice qualities would have sold well had they been available. The run was light, and the medium to good butcher sold steady to firm, but the light common mixed cattle were slow, and the light rough eastern stockers hard to sell.

For stockers and feeders of good quality there was an improved demand, many farmers in for the exhibition making enquiries.

Quotations were: Extra choice heavy butcher, \$6 to \$6.25; medium choice, \$5.50 to \$5.75; choice fat cows, steady \$4.50 to \$5; medium \$4 to \$4.25; common mixed butcher, \$3.50 to \$4.50; canners, \$1.75 to \$2.50.

Stockers and feeders, \$3.50 to \$4.85; light common eastern stockers, \$2.50 to \$3.25.

Calves, steady at \$4 to \$5.

Sheep, market dull at \$3.50 to \$4.25; bucks and culls, \$2.50 to \$3.25.

Hogs, market 30c to 40c lower than last week. Selects, \$7.70 fed and watered, and \$7.35, f.o.b.
