

Government Crop Report

Ottawa, June 11, 1915.—A press bullet-in issued to-day by the Census and Sta-tistics Office is of special interest as giving the preliminary estimate of the giving the preliminary estimate of the area sown to grain crops in Canada tor the present season and the condition of these crops on May 31, as reported by correspondents. The reports received show that in the Maritime provinces cold and rainy weather during May de-layed farm work, and at the end of the month a good deal of seeding has still to month a good deal of seeding has still to be completed. In Quebec and Ontario cold winds and frost, coming after the exceptionally warm weather of April, retarded grown. In these provinces the frosts injured pastures, but did little damage to grain crops. In the Northwest provinces growth was checked somewhat by cold and frosty nights, but, on the whole, conditions continue to be favourable. In some parts of Mantoba and Saskatchewan the need of rain was being feit. In Alberta and British Columbia the conditions of the grain crops was generally favourable.
