 Toronto, April 4.—Receipts at the Union stockyards to-day were 702 cattle, 178 calves, 873 hogs and 78 sheep and lambs.
 The market holds good and steady at the recent high prices, but trade was not quite so active as yesterday. The run was comparatively light and while the demand is still keen for the choicest butchers buyers were not inclined to run up prices on the medium stuff. A few small lots of choice heavy prime were offering, but the average quality was not as high as yesterday.
 There is a good demand for choice quality stockers, but the offerings are small. Milch cows and calves are still easy.
 Sheep and lambs are steady for choice quality, but the offerings are few and quality poor.

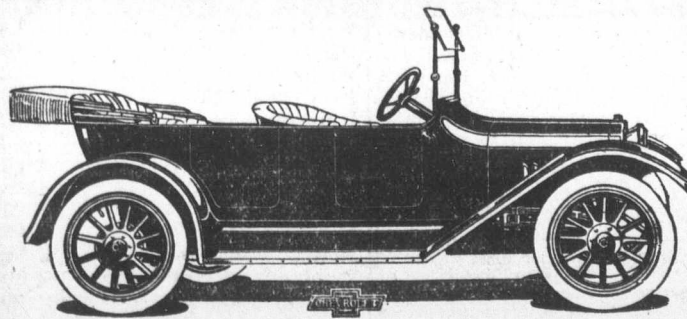
