divined my thoughts, and I recollected that he was conscious of another eye and ear, which occasionally watched outside for hours. The guard was under surveillance as well I. Ten o'clock came, and he rose according to custom, and handed me my prayer-book. It was my wont to read from it at that hour. This had once been a form to me, but was now a great comfort. I felt sure he had placed something in it. Changing my position so that I could read without being watched in case of espionage, I opened the book. I was not disappointed. A tiny piece of paper lay within, and in a female hand-writing, I read these words:

" The night of the 17th at the Caft Anglais,a tall, dark man, wearing the Legion of Honour." I read, and re-read, without guessing the engina. Yet I dared not look at Victor. This mysterious scrap of paper was the key to my present situation. I shut my eyes, and mentally went over my engagements from the first of the month up to the time of my arrest. That was on the 20th of March. Little by little, my habits of self-examinations, aided me in putting the scene together, until the 17th stood out clear in relief to memory. The morning of that day, I had read of the murder in the Cafe des Bons Garçons. It had not impressed me very deeply. But now I strove to recall the circumstances.

A youth fresh from London, with apparently plenty of mone, had sauntered out to see the lions. He fell in with a very polite stranger, who, pitying his ignorance of French, volunteered his services as an escort. 
