you referring to?

MEMBER OF THE PRESS: Southern Africa.

MR. HEAD: I would just be guessing, at the present time, because we did not get to it.

What the Prime Minister and the President said today-almost as we were getting up from the table was that there
was a need and a desire on the part of each to talk about
Rhodesia, Libya, and so on.

We have no idea, at the present time, what the current
U.S. Administration attitude is towards the Kissinger proposal
for the Rhodesian Fund, for example. I would just be speculating.
We will have to wait until tomorrow.

MEMBER OF THE PRESS: Mr. Head, did I understand you to say that while the President was not asking, necessarily, for Mr. Trudeau's advice; that Mr. Trudeau encouraged the President to continue his current approach towards Human Rights?

I think you used the word "encouraging".

MR. HEAD: Yes, "encouraging", but encouraging his continued interest, and attention, and attitudes.

MEMBER OF THE PRESS: Not necessarily his methods?

MR. HEAD: Not necessarily his methods, no. It would be wrong for the Prime Minister, I think, to say; "Good!

I will write to Sakharov next week, too!"

That kind of detail did not come up.
