

## THE SENATE OF CANADA

### BILL T<sup>2</sup>.

An Act for the relief of Albert Henry Pergley.

Preamble.

**W**HEREAS Albert Henry Pergley, domiciled in Canada and residing at the city of Montreal, in the province of Quebec, head waiter, has by his petition alleged that on the fourteenth day of September, A.D. 1928, at the said city, he and Ethel Pomeroy, who was then of the said city, a spinster, were married; and whereas by his petition he has prayed that, because of her adultery since then, their marriage be dissolved; and whereas the said marriage and adultery have been proved by evidence adduced and it is expedient that the prayer of his petition be granted: Therefore His Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:—

Marriage dissolved.

**1.** The said marriage between Albert Henry Pergley and Ethel Pomeroy, his wife, is hereby dissolved, and shall be henceforth null and void to all intents and purposes whatsoever.

Right to marry again.

**2.** The said Albert Henry Pergley may at any time hereafter marry any woman whom he might lawfully marry if the said marriage with the said Ethel Pomeroy had not been solemnized.
