Mr. Speaker, during his recent trip to Asia, our Prime Minister has once again played Santa Claus, for he has distributed loans to certain countries.

He will soon be telling Canadians—once again—that they must tighten their belts, and that they will have to make sacrifices. He will tell them: Tighten your belts so as to pay for the gifts that I have just distributed in Asiatic countries which, in turn, have given me very nice publicity as an international Superman.

I have no time, today, to give out the list of the interest free loans granted since 1968 to more than 50 countries, but I would like however to bring two of these to the attention of the House. During his recent trips, the Prime Minister has granted an interest free gift-loan of \$94 million to Ceylon, payable in 50 years. He has furthermore granted an interest free loan of \$4.5 million to Indonesia, payable in 50 years, with a 10 year period of grace, if that country so wishes.

If he were, would he still state that these loans which help both Canada and Ceylon are harmful?

Mr. Rondeau: Mr. Speaker, I am delighted to hear the member for Lapointe make those remarks. I believe he learned about this matter recently, for we have known for quite some time that this money is used to buy Canadian products. This is even worse, Mr. Speaker.

If this money is used to buy Canadian products—and we have nothing against that—we do say that the same gifts that we offer to the Indonesians or the Cingalise should be given to the people of Quebec, of New Brunswick, of Nova Scotia, of the western provinces; Canadians should be entitled to the same interest-free loans for the purpose of buying Canadian products. This would benefit the economy and make it possible to raise the standard of living of Canadian people and it would also enable them to pay only once for the public services they

The hon. member for Lapointe approves of the fact that interest-free loans are granted to foreigners; if those same loans were granted to the Province of Quebec, we could build schools, CEGEPs, technical schools or help public developments through the construction of bridges, roads, including the East-West expressway in Montreal, and enable all Canadians to pay only once for those roads, those bridges and those schools.

Mr. Guay (Lévis): That is exactly what we are doing.
