#### POSSIBILITY OF LOWERING AGE OF ELIGIBILITY FOR OLD AGE PENSION TO 60—REQUEST FOR UNANIMOUS CONSENT TO MOVE MOTION

#### CONTRACT NEGOTIATIONS IN ESSENTIAL INDUSTRIES—REQUEST FOR UNANIMOUS CONSENT TO MOVE MOTION

**Mr. Ken Hurlburt (Lethbridge):** Mr. Speaker, in view of the fact the Canadian public is unrepresented at the bargaining table when the employers and employees who operate our essential services negotiate a new contract in good or bad faith, as the case may be, and in view of the fact it is the Canadian public that suffers the inconvenience and hardship when a strike or lockout results and ultimately must pay the cost of a settlement, I ask leave of the House to move, under Standing Order 43, seconded by the hon. member for Calgary South (Mr. Bawden):

That this House is of the opinion that the government should consider the advisability of introducing legislation that would impose financial damages in equal measure upon corporations and trade unions operating essential industries under federal jurisdiction for every day that such corporations and trade unions fail to negotiate a new contract after the expiration of the previously existing contract.
