If those are the results of high interest rates, and they are indeed the results, why does the government not assume its responsibility and direct the banks to bring down the interest rates?

Hon. Allan J. MacEachen (Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Finance): Madam Speaker, the hon. member knows perfectly well, and surely he has not been the first to think about a simple solution like that, as if everybody is going around groping for a way to battle inflation, that there is a very easy way, and that is just to direct the governor of the bank to reduce interest rates.

Mr. Crosbie: That's what you told us.

Mr. MacEachen: That is the simplistic solution proposed by the hon. member. He knows perfectly well that the net effect of that proposal, whatever its effects in the short term, would be increased inflation and subsequently even higher interest rates. That is the result of his policy. He says the only way to get interest rates down is to change the government. I know one way to get interest rates even higher than they are today, and that would be to follow the economic advice of the hon. member.

Some hon. Members: Hear, hear!

Mr. Broadbent: Madam Speaker, even the minister should know that that is nonsense. I will come to my last question.
