4. The question of treatment for men suffering from tuberculosis has engaged the attention of the Military Hospitals Commission since its inception. Use has been made of existing sanatoria, and in many cases additions have been erected, partly at the expense of the sanatorium authorities. Several institutions have been taken over entirely by the Commission and are being operated as sanatoria.

MORNING SITTINGS OF THE SENATE.

MOTION.

Hon. Sir JAMES LOUGHEED moved:

That commencing on Tuesday next, unless differently ordered, there shall be two distinct sittings of the Senate every day, the first sitting to commence at 11 o'clock a.m., until 1 o'clock p.m., and the second sitting to commence at 3 o'clock p.m., and that all Standing and Select Committees of the Senate be permitted to sit while the Senate is in session, notwithstanding anything contrary in Rule 86.

Hon. Mr. BOSTOCK: I would ask my honourable friend if it is necessary to pass this motion at the present time. We have only two orders on the Order Paper to-day and have a very light Order Paper apparently for to-morrow unless there are other Bills coming up. Although my honourable friend stated last Thursday, I think, that he expected we should probably prorogue next Saturday, from what I can learn I do not think that event is liable to come about quite so soon. I should like my honourable friend to consider whether this motion could not stand. We do not wish to interfere or to retard the business of the House.

Hon. Sir JAMES LOUGHEED: In my judgment the motion is desirable. We have before us to-day the Income Tax Bill, which
