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Society was incorporated in 1872. Its expenditures in twenty-three years amounted to about \$630,000. It received in donations over \$91,000; and it circulated publications to the value of \$500,000. About \$155,000 have been spent in Colportage,—and 245 years of labour were devoted to this object. Religious Books, Tracts, Magazines, Sabbath School Papers, Libraries at half price, &c., are specialties of the Society's Depository, 117 Granville St., Halifax.

Its object is the improvement of the "spiritual, moral, mental and social condition of the young men of the City of Halifax." It owns a handsome building which has cost over \$40,000. It has a large Library and a spacious and well supplied Reading Room; also Committee Rooms, Class Rooms, Parlor, Gymnasium and Dining Room. —Any person of good moral character may become a member, but no one can serve on committee or be an officer of the Association without being a member in good standing of some Evangelical Church.
