Bisons Take the First

The Enemy Capture Number One Milligan Shuts Out the Leafs

The enemy are here. Not only that, but they marched off with the first game of the series, the locals having to bend low to one Southside Milligan, who was an enigma to the Pets. The score was 3 to 0.

While the lefty visitor had everything in the repertoire, yet seven bingles were registered off him, two of which came in succession in the fifth, but the needful was lacking. Three charities were issued by the "main squeeze," and a couple fanned, but no less than fifteen fled out, and only four of these were to the outfield.

Dicky Rudolph, who was on the mound for the Bisons, pitched good enough ball to win, as the hit column will indicate, but the visitors managed to bunt hits when they most counted, with the above result. He fanned four, and was as charitable as his opponent.

The features outside the twirling was Carriagan's clever backstop work. Smith's catch of McAllister's fly in the fifth, Wiedensaul's batting, and Smith's busy day at second, he having no less than eight put-outs, four of them off Crooks.

The locals started off well, Wiedy leading with a single, and while Kelly beat out a bunt, yet nothing showed on the tally-sheet. The Leafs had two singles in succession in the fifth, but not a man reached third till the seventh, when Rudolph was passed, with Wiedy out of the way. It was in the eighth, when, with one down, he dished to left Flynn's outstretched hand to third, but there he died as Erick fled out.

A double-play retired the visitors in the initial innings, while in the fourth, a base on balls to Gettman, a sacrifice and a wild pitch sent him to third, but he was caught coming home, with Murray at the bat, when the squeeze-play failed to work.

The Bisons tallied two in the seventh, Erick missed Murray's messy ground-cr, and with the hit and run sign Smith struck at a high one to right for a single. Both base-warmer pulled off a double-steal. McConnell failed to get on and with two and nothing on Hill, Rudolph and Carriagan held a consultation, with the result that Rudolph put the next right over the plate, and Hill, who was anxious to hit, biffed out a single, scoring the two men. McAllister hit into a double.

JIMMY BRITT. Decision Awarded to Gans Last Night After Britt Had Broken His Wrist in the Fifth Round—Gans Is Now Lightweight Champion.

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Gans Wins Frisco Fight

GANS IS STILL CHAMPION BRITT LASTS FIVE ROUNDS

After First Colored Boxer Has All Better of Battle—Britt Is Groggy in Fourth and Breaks His Arm in Fifth.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 9.—Joe Gans defeated Jimmy Britt in five rounds this afternoon on the ball grounds.

Shortly before the gates were opened, the management discovered a wholesale attempt to pack the grounds with bogus admissions. The police were informed that several thousand spurious tickets had been unloaded. This called for a careful scrutiny of every ticket presented, and resulted in a number of arrests and much delay at the turnstiles. There was a fair sprinkling of women in the crowd that worked their way into the grounds.

At 1:20 p.m. the south bleachers rose to the entrance of the champion. Gans came in with a slight limp, and wore an ulster and a blue cap, and carried a suit-case.

Neither fighter had to put up with the sun in his eyes, as an annoying feature in recent open-air contests. The sky was leaden and a chilly wind was blowing from the northwest. The early afternoon betting odds were 10 to 7, with Gans the favorite.

Ante-Bellum Dictum.
Before the battle Gans said: "The public will get a run for its money, am out to win, and have told my friends to bet on me. I am forced to win this fight to prove the statements I made following that other fight with Britt. I would rather beat Britt than any other man in the world—bar one—and I think I can do it. It's a hard matter to pick round, but I can say this much, it will be a short fight if I can make it short."

"I realize that I am to face the hardest proposition of my career in the contest to-day, but I don't believe that Joe Gans can show me anything new in the fighting game. My fight with Jensen showed that I am able to deliver punishment and take it, too. I am making no pretension as to victory, but I will terminate, because I will be in the ring to win at the best opportunity, going the limit if necessary."

Britt, who was popular with the opinion of Gans would win. He thought that the colored champion was a better boxer than Britt, besides being a harder hitter.

At 3:15 p.m. Gans entered the ring. He was introduced as the only lightweight champion of the world, and was dressed in a green velvet robe, and a green flowered velvet dressing gown. As he took his corner a pink and red flag was waved around him further to protect him from the chilly winds. Gans was seconded by Alvin King, Willie Keefe and Kid North.

Britt entered the ring at 3:20 o'clock. He was introduced as a native son of the Golden State, and one of the gamiest fighters that ever stepped into a ring. Britt was given a tremendous ovation. Britt's seconds were Spider Kelly, Tim Keeling, Frank Rafael and Bob Corbett. Britt was seconded by Alvin King, Willie Keefe and Kid North.
