COMMON SCHOOL FUND CASE

Came Before Supreme Court at Ottawa Yesterday.

GREAT ARRAY OF COUNSEL

Mr. Trenholme, Q.C., Opened the Ball by a Motion to Quash.

Ontario Contended Against Any Liability

Whatever in Respect of School Lands

Quebec Ralies Objections - After Considerable Argument Judgment Was Reserved

Millia Orders - Drummond Railroad Not Taken Over - Ottawa News Generally.

Ottawa, Nov. 2.-The Supreme Court to-day was crowded with counsel, when the common school fund case, Ontario v. Quebec and Canada, was called.

Chief Justice, Sir Henry Strong, and Justices King, Taschereau, Gwynne and Sedgewick were on the bench.

Mr. Justice Gwynne, having been counsel in the case previously, was not sitting.

Messrs. Blake, Q.C., Irving, Q.C., and Clarke were for the appellants, and Trenholme, Q.C., Beique, Q.C., Hall, Q.C., and Hogg, Q.C., for the respondents.

Mr. Trenholme, on behalf of Quebec, moved to quash the appeal, on the ground of lack of jurisdiction.

He called attention to Ontario's notice of appeal, which was in substance that Ontario contended against any liability whatever in respect of school lands.

Quebec contended that this was the first time Ontario has raised the question of no liability, and that she raises it in this case, as if the Supreme Court were a court of original jurisdiction.

Quebec was now called upon to answer this question and objected. Mr. Justice King remarked that the question was dealt with by the Chancellor Mr. Trenholme granted this, but it was dealt with in his reasons, not by the arbitrator or court.

Quebec has good reasons to object to meeting this question now, and took high ground. Under the statute only such questions as the commissioners agreed upon were submitted to arbitration.

A declaration of submission was drawn up, intended to convey the questions in appeal. These questions were to ascertain what lands had not been sold, and to ascertain the amount of liability. This could not go beyond them, and Ontario, by agreeing to this declaration of submission, had admitted liability.

Blake, Q.C., said that the case had been taken by surprise, by notice of this motion being given on Oct. 25, when the appeal was made in February, 1896.

The case had been entered on, and only removed for want of a quorum. All parties had agreed to it, and had submitted a joint case in March, 1896.

Afterwards all parties agreed to a joint appeal.

Judgment Reserved.

On completion of the arguments on the motion to quash, judgment was reserved, and the hearing on the merits of the Ontario appeal taken up, after which the Quebec appeal will be heard.

Council of the Dominion will be heard also as to the position the Federal Government occupies in relation to certain monies forming part of the fund.

The arbitrators, Sir L. N. Cassault, the Hon. Chancellor Boyd and Mr. Justice Burdidge, made a partial award in the matter referred to them under the statutes, on Feb. 6, 1896, and the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec the separate apportionment from portions of the award so made.

On being asked if the Government had taken over the Drummond Counties Railway on the 1st inst., as was intended by the act, the answer was not finished yet, and will not be finished for another fortnight.

Atlantic Mail Service. Messrs. James Chatham, James McLellan and Campbell of the Beaver Line had an interview with Hon. R. W. Scott, acting Minister of Trade and Commerce, and submitted the final proposals of the company for the Atlantic mail service.

The Interior Department has been advised that Mr. Sutton and party have returned to Vancouver, and will go to Victoria to-day.

A project is on foot for the erection of a large cotton mill on the famous table rock at the Chaudiere, which is regarded as perhaps the best site for water power in the Dominion of Canada.

Asphyxiation at Newmarket. Mrs. F. Irwin and hired girl found in a dying condition in their home - Mrs. Irwin May Die.

Newmarket, Ont., Nov. 2.-Mrs. F. Irwin and her hired girl were asphyxiated by stove gas on Saturday night.

It appears Mrs. Irwin had filled the stove with coal on Saturday evening, after which she and the girl retired to their respective rooms.

Apparently Mrs. Irwin had, after a lapse of time, discovered that there was an escape of gas and had made an effort to rise, but had probably been taken over.

GOING TO HEAR THE EXPERTS

The Premier and Sir Louis Davies to Visit Washington: WILL LEAVE NEXT MONDAY.

Conference to Follow Will Be Solely for the Hearing of Evidence.

Meanwhile the United States, Russian and Japanese Envoys are Making Important Preparations to sign an Agreement for the Suspension of Pelagic Sealing in Behring Sea and the North Pacific Ocean, regardless of Great Britain's Attitude.

Ottawa, Nov. 2.-The Premier and Sir Louis Davies will leave for Washington Monday next, accompanied by Prof. Macoun and Mr. R. N. Venning, chief clerk of the Fisheries Department.

The conference which will convene soon after is consigned to the Canadian Government only on the express condition that it is solely for the purpose of hearing the experts and collecting the evidence which they have gathered by personal observation of the seal rookeries during the past few years.
