Exciting Chase and Capture of an
Alleged Murderer Near Kamloops.

Kamloops, B. C., April 21.—Casimir
Baptiste, the Indian charged with mur-
dering Philip Walker here on Saturday
evening, is now behind the bars in
Kamloops jail. About 9 o'clock Wed-
nesday morning word was brought to
town that the man was in Chief Louis'
house on the reserve, just across the
river from the city. Immediately
about 30 armed men started for the re-
serve, followed by nearly half the citi-
zens. On reaching the reserve, Alex.
McLean, a half-breed, was sent to in-
terview Baptiste. In a few minutes
McLean returned with word that Casi-
mir was willing to give himself up to
his chief, but would shoot the first
white man who approached the house.
The chief being absent, McLean was
again sent to tell Casimir that if he
did not surrender by 1 o'clock the
police would open fire on him. Time
dragged on, and still the murderer,
rifle in hand, paced up and down the
room, passing and repassing the door,
in full view of all present. Shortly
after 12, women and children were
removed from the adjacent houses
and all arrangements made to open
fire. McLean again interviewed Casi-
mir, with the result that Casimir prom-
ised to surrender if he were allowed to
fire off all his ammunition. This was
granted, and a few minutes later Casi-
mir appeared at an upper window and
fired ten shots, the last two coming
dangerously close to two citizens. Casi-
mir then threw down his rifle, and
promptly at 1 o'clock opened the door,
walked out, and quietly stepped into a
rig which was waiting to convey him
to jail. Fifteen minutes later he was
safely behind the bars.

The most intense excitement pre-
vailed all along. The county court,
which was in session adjourned, and
everybody either went to the reserve
or secured places on the tops of build-
ings, where they could see every move-
ment. Over 1,000 people followed the
vehicle containing the prisoner to the
jail, and when the doors closed behind
Casimir they gave a cheer and dispe-
sed. Casimir will be tried at the assizes
here next week.
