The World's Hop Crop. The National Association of English Hop Growers have issued the following report, dated London, Sept. 12, which states: The world's crop may thus be assumed to be as under: England, 350,000 cwt; European continent, 720,000 cwt; United States of America, 350,000 cwt; Canada, Australia, etc. (perhaps), 10,000 cwt. Total crop of the world, 1,430,000 cwt. The world's consumption is variously estimated from 1,650,000 to 1,845,000 cwt. Taking the mean of these figures we arrive at about 1,750,000 cwt as the approximate annual requirement, and this shows that a deficiency of fully 300,000 cwt has to be provided for in the present year. Stocks in hand cannot be drawn upon to any extent, as they are considered to be lower than at any time since the famine year of 1882 there-

fore they will not appreciably affect the position."

SCIENTIFIC CONGRESSES

Result in Benefit to canada-rne Anglo-American Unity Idea.

The Globe of yesterday has an interview with Prof. A. B. McCallum, brother of Dr. H. A. McCallum, of this city, giving at some length his impressions formed while attending three scientific congresses—the British As-sociation at Edinburgh, the International Physiological Association at Cambridge, and the British Association at Bristol. An especially large number of Canadians attended the latter meeting, which was the most important from a general point, said the pro-fessor. The Toronto meeting last year, he found, had been an excellent means of making Canada better known

throughout the British Isles. As to the Anglo-American alliance, Prof. McCallum said: "On all hands I was asked as to the Canadian view of the present feeling of sympathy evinced by the Americans for England, whether it was genuine, and how long it would last. It is extraordinary among a certain class in England how strong the desire is for an alliance or some thorough understanding on points which affect

the future of both nations." This eagerness, the professor thinks, is on the verge of the undignified, and is certain to be misunderstood in the United States. In many quarters he noticed the feeling that the United States are not equipped for a policy of expansion. Their diplomatic service is looked upon as the worst in the world, and Englishmen think there is great need of reform in American

OLD IN CRIME

Wm. Chisholm the Well-Known Horse-Thief in Jail at Woodstock Aged About 80 Years.

William Chisholm, who is well-known throughout Ontario as one of the worst old men who ever lived, is now in Woodstock jail. Chisholm is nearly 80 years of age, and all his life has been a horse thief. He has been sent from London several times to serve terms in Kingston and in the Central at Toronto. Just how the old man gets around is what astonishes the police authorities. The last time he was here, about two months ago, he was so decrepit that he was moved with difficulty, and was sent down for a short period for vagrancy. Chisholm, in his way, is a veritable "Fagan," and is most happy when in company with those of the "Bill Sykes" character. Chisholm wandered to Tilsonburg last week and was arrested by Chief Pow. Referring to his arrest the Woodstock Sentinel-Review says: "A few days ago Chief Pow, of Tilsonburg, brought an old man named Chisholm, as a vagrant, without means of support, to Woodstock jail. The career of the old man is a pitiful ending to a life of crime. He was a notorious horse thief, and belonged to an organized gang that was in existence many years ago. He has spent the greater part of his life in prison. A few weeks ago he was provided with funds to go to the States, but was arrested at Jackson, Mich., and sent back last week. He has been wandering about in a pitiful condition, and on Saturday was in a state of helpless filth. He was taken to jail for shelter, and County Representative Fero will make an effort at the county council today to secure admission for I refuse all others.

Hospital Building Committee Will Stick to Their Plans.

While the Money Lasts the Work Will Go On -The Necessary Balance Lies in the County Treasury—Ald. Jolly's Attempt to Renew Negotiations Frustrated.

While the money holds out the hospital building committee will tollow strictly the plan of the new building, as already begun. Chairman Carrothers wanted the plans altered, but his motion to that effect, as referred from the council, was discussed by the committee last night, and defeated. The motion was that the present contagious diseases' building be not taken down at present, and the erection of the new pavilion for males postponed until the committee has secured the necessary funds to complete the building. In opposition to this, the mayor elicited from Clerk of the Works Dodd that by such a course a saving of not more than \$3,000 would be effected.

The mayor and Dr. Campbell agreed as medical men that the proposed change would materially interfere with the classification of the patients, and be most objectionable.

Ald. McPhillips gave legal advice that the city would be liable to the contractors for the specific performance of the contract; therefore, he was opposed to the chairman's motion. Ald. Wilkey's only objection was that the financial position would be very little bettered.

Ald. Jolly had a solution to offer also. There was \$15,000 in the county council's treasury, he said, which the city might have been in possession of before now; only some of the aldermen chose to go against the interests of the city, and refused to negotiate with the

The chairman and the speaker locked horns on this subject, and some warm words passed.

Ald. Wilkey thought Ald. Carrothers "too short," and Ald, Jolly said if he (the chairman) knew all about it there was no use of the others saying anything. The county was acting just as the city would do, if in the same position.

Ald. Jolly moved that clause four in the proposed agreement with the county be amended to read as follows: 'The gross charge to the county for their patients, including admittance, maintenance and treatment to be the actual cost after crediting the county with the government grant of 30 cents per patient per day; and that, should the actual cost of maintenance, exclusive of the government grant, be more than 75 cents, the county to have the privilege to cancel this agreement by giving six months' notice; and that, should the grant from the government be withdrawn, the city should have the same privilege of canceling the agree-

This was ruled out of order, and Ald. Jolly appealed. The chairman was sustained by Ald. Gerry's vote. Ald. Wilkey refused to vote, and Ald. McPhillips stood by Ald. Jolly.

A complaint from the clerk of the works about some of the plastering done by Contractors Pritchett and Murray Bros. in the contagious diseases' building was considered. It is special work, and the contractors refused to follow the specifications.
"It is so bad," said Ald. Carrothers,

"that if a man went in there with the measles, he would come out with the smallpox."

Ald. McPhillips said someone should be engaged to do the work properly if the present contractors persisted in their refusal.

Ald. Carrothers said they should cancel the contract if the work is not done to the satisfaction of the architect. It was decided on motion of Ald. Wilkey to visit the hospital this morning at nine o'clock and decide what course to take.
