Arthur Seager was born at Staten Island, N. Y., and went to Paris in 1912. He enlisted there in the French foreign legion. His early letters on the war make delightful reading, said Mr. Gunn. In June, 1916, he wrote his mother that he expected an offensive about July 4. It came and the foreign legion was sent to drive the Germans out of a certain French village. Seager was one of the first to fall from German machine gun bullets fired from ambush.

Trotter was born in Toronto. His father was a professor at McMaster. Later the family lived in Nova Scotia and then returned to Ontario. The young poet was educated at Woodstock College. 
