A medal donated by Andrew Braid was sold to Col. McGregor for \$25.

This was a reproduction of the medal which the Germans had struck in commemoration of the sinking of the Lusitania, and which will serve as an eternal witness to the depths of degration of the sinking of the crowdent of heavy auty fire apparatus.
