British Headquarters, Nov. 26—There is not much humor in the fighting of the last week, but one incident occurred which is making the whole British air service laugh to day. One of the youngest British airmen was flying at a low altitude, when four enemy machine guns opened on him. He swooped down and shot three of his, opponents as he swept by. The fourth machine gun kept firing, and the aviator, in a spirit of boyish mischief, leaned over the side of his car and wriggled his fingers in joyouse derision at the German. Just as he was in the midst of this interesting performance his opponent put a bullet squarely through the palm of the airman's open hand.

The aviator presented himself at a dressing station, and when queried admitted the truth with crestfallen face. His consolation for his wound was roars of laughter and advice to be more polite to a Boche in the future.

Western Cavalrymen Heroes of Magnificent Exploit In Drive At Hindy's Line.

Canadian Army Headquarters in France, Nov. 26.—Canada was splendidly represented in the great British advance of November 20, which broke the Hindenburg line and drove the enemy back on Cambrai. For the first time since the German retreat from Bapaume last spring the Canadian cavalry went really into action with their horses. Operating from the right centre opposite the

ating from the right centre opposite the village of Masnieres, the cavalry behind the line waited at dawn for the signal which would send them forward after the tanks and infantry and opened a way. The anxiously-waited signal came and the "Hell-For-Leather" Fort Garrys galloped to the attack. But Masnieres was not clear. The bridge over the river in front of the village had collapsed under the weight of a British tank, and the approach to it was swept by enemy rifie and machine gun fire.

Bridge the Gap.

For an hour and a half, while patrols reconnointed the country, the Fort Garrys waited under enemy fire. Another bridge took them across the river, but they were confronted with the L-Escaut Canal on the other side. Findally, under a concentrated enemy machine gun fire, the troopers, working side by side with the splendid British infantry, bridged the gap. In single file the dismounted men and their dhorses got across the canal. It was 3:30 p.m. when they penetrated the enemy's country through the wire cut by the British troops, who were south of the town, and galloped on "into the blue."

THE ONLY GOOD GERMAN IS A WEICHEL GERMAN

"The framhies bill does not apply here; it's to the foreigners in the west," explained Mr. Weichel. If this is not a straight appeal to the German vote on the part of a Borden Government candidate, what may it be called.

Section 67 of the Dominion Election Act disqualifies, for the war-time election, those of alien enemy birth, or of other European birth within alien jurisdiction, and of alien mother tongue or native language, who have been naturalized in Canada since March 31, 1902.

That is plain enough for any child to see, yet Mr. Weichel, if the Globe is to be regarded as giving a faithful report, distinctly said that he had specially "fixed up" the German vote in Waterloo, while the German vote in the west would have to remain away from the polls. Many of these "repatriated" voters were, no doubt, Mr. Weichel's voters. At least one might suppose that Mr. Weichel would do such a thing for his own voters.

If the war-time election act was to damn Germans, it must not damn Mr. Weichel's Germans, and if we are not much mistaken from a page from the history of two years ago, it was Mr. Weichel's Germans who should have been especially provided for. Very few-not enough to count on the fingers of one hand-have been interned. Many others to judge from the unfortunate outbreak of Saturday night, were regarding themselves as having lost their franchises.

In London there is a man of German birth who has always conducted himself in a manner to win the respect of his neighbors. He is wondering whether Mr. Weichel's special Waterloo brand of munificence will reach him. He has been in Canada fourteen years and three months, and he took out his papers when he first came to this country. Prior to coming to London he had lived in the United States since 1898. As far as he is able, he says, he has long ago cut every find with the Fatherland. He would like to vote if other Germans are to get the vote. But he has been told at both committee rooms that he cannot

THEIR ATTACK Action of Majority of Enumer ators Forces the Electors to Personally Take Action to Insure That They Will Not Be Classed With A liens and Minors.

You will if you do not take good care to have your name on the list. There are many enumerators who are apparently doing their best to disfranchise you. If you have a vote it will not be the fault of some of these gentlemen. There are some who are doing good service, who are making conscientious efforts to get all the names in the subdivision over which they have charge. There are others who are not doing this. Their efforts are so barefased that they may defeat the objects of the Borden machine in London. For instance, take a certain subdivision in London, The enumerator told a party that he had finished. There are about 220 names of male voters for municipal purposes on the lists. These include owners and tenants. The enumerator has 170 names all told on his list, and of these 80 are women. More than half the voters in that subdivision are disfranchised.

The Advertiser named another subdivision where there were 170 names on the list when at least names on the list when at least 350 should be counted. The enumerator for this subdivision is also supposed to have done his work—he has in one sense.

That is the kind of justice that the citizens of London are getting. Other cases, probably not so flagrant, can be mentioned.

In addition to their failure to put on proper names, they are actively canvassing for the Borden candidate. Is this the kind of justice which is so blatantly preached about in certain newspapers?
