GERMANY SURRENDERS 20. SUBS TO THE ALLIES TODAY

VERY ANXIOUS TO CO-OPERATE

GERMANY HANDS OVER 20 ADMIRAL OFF HARWICH

First Lot of Enemy U-Boats Is Surrendered at Sunrise This Morning—Undersea Craft Will Proceed to English Port in Charge of German Crews, Who Will There Board Transports for Their Return Home.

London, Nov. 20.—Twenty German submarines were surrendered to Rear Admiral Reginald W. Tyrwhitt 30 miles off Harwich this morning at sunrise, according to a Press Association dispatch. These are the first U-boats to be turned over to the Allies by Germany

Admiral Tyrwhitt received the surrender of the German craft on board his flagship, a British cruiser.

The surrendered submarines will proceed to Harwich in charge of their own crews. The U-boats will then be boarded by British chancellors' palace next to the foreign crews and interpreters and proceed to Parkeston Quay nearby. The Germans will leave the submarines there and board transports for

Twenty additional submarines will be surrendered on Thursday and twenty more on Friday. The remainder of the U-boats to be handed over in accordance with the armistice terms will be given up later.

BOLSHEVIK LOSSES ARE FIVE TIMES THAT OF THE ALLIES

Archangel, Nov. 14.—(By the Associated Press.)—The Bolshevik forces along the Dvina, their infantry attacks having been repulsed, to-day were bombarding the Russo-Allied positions on the left bank of the river at Tulgas. The Allied artillery is replying vigorously. late in September the Bolsheviki have been trying stubborn but fruitlessly to drive the Allied forces up the Dvina to north of its junction with the Vaga. The small amount of ice in the river at this

time of the year is helping the enemy gunboats. The Bolsheviki apparently possess a large number of river craft on which to mount nava guns, brought from Petrograd. As long as the enemy gunboats are able to move the Americans and British are combatting great odds. But the enemy infantry is no match

for the Allies. The Bolshevik losses in killed, wounded and captured being at least five times that of the Allies.
