

Three outstanding features marked the forehoon session today of the Synod of the Diocese of Huron discussion:

(1) Discussion of increase of the minimum stipend for both junior and senior clergy; (2) Discussion of Sunday school work, which hereafter will be known as a "department of the board of religious education," and a resolution introduced by Charles Jenkins of Petrolea for the establishment of a diocesan library.

After three readings, the notice of motion of the Bishop of Huron, presented by E. G. Henderson, re increase of stipends, was passed with a fine show of unanimity. Hereafter, the minimum stipend for junior clergy, otherwise those who have served less than ten years, will be \$1,000 instead of \$900; and the minimum stipend for senior clergy, those of ten years' experience or more, is advanced from \$1,000 to \$1,200.

In event of a mission being unable to make up the whole of the difference between the old and new standard of stipend, the synod will increase its present grant to an amount equal to one-half of the difference, between the old and new standard of stipend, the synod will increase its present grant to an amount equal to one-half of the difference, so long as the mission makes up the other half, and that the total grant from the mission fund to any clergyman does not exceed \$300 a year.
