

TORONTO DROVER IS GIVEN FIVE YEARS FOR MANSLAUGHTER

Neill Courtts Pleads Guilty at Owen Sound.

OWEN SOUND, Sept. 18.—Convicted of manslaughter Neill Courtts of Toronto was sentenced to five years in the penitentiary at the fall assizes here today. At first Courtts was charged with the murder of William Umbach at Ayrton on July 23 last, but this morning the plea of not guilty drawn and a plea of guilty to a charge of manslaughter substituted. This action was taken after a conference between the counsel for the accused, the crown counsel and the judge.

Mr. Justice Lennox is presiding over the assizes, with T. J. Agar of Toronto as crown counsel, N. Jeffery of Owen Sound, assisted by A. S. Clarke of Mount Forest, was counsel for Courtts. During his counsel's plea for clemency and the address of the judge the prisoner showed great emotion and wiped his eyes many times. After hearing that his sentence was to be five years he walked quite briskly out of court.

URGENT RIVER WATER FOR INDUSTRIES AND LARGER RESERVOIR

To Conserve Spring Water—Public Utilities To Hear Plans.

Conservation of the supply of spring drinking water was discussed at a meeting of the public utilities commission Thursday afternoon. A report on the matter will likely be made at the next meeting by General Manager E. V. Buchanan. This will be based on replies received to a circular letter sent to large water users asking their opinion of using river water for industrial purposes.

The Grand Trunk Railway is already using river water, which the commission has agreed to pump for them.

Other firms may be supplied if the revenue which would be derived from warranting it, and it is possible that in time the Canadian Pacific Railroad might also be supplied.

Larger Reservoir Likely.

This is only one of the methods which will be used to conserve the spring water. A much larger reservoir will likely be built soon, so that it will be possible to store sufficient water to meet the needs in the summer months.

There is at present a shortage of half a million gallons a day during hot weather, but there was a sufficiently large reservoir enough water could be pumped into it at normal times to meet the needs of the city.

The present reservoir holds only six or seven million gallons.

ONT. FLAX GROWERS APPROVE GOVERNMENT STANDARD REGULATIONS

Members of the Ontario Flax Growers' Association went on record as being in unanimous approval of the Dominion Government regulations, protecting the standard quality of Canadian flax for export, at a largely attended meeting in the Tecumseh house, Wednesday evening.

The meeting also discussed the usage of mechanical aids.

INJURED AT KINGSVILLE

KINGSVILLE, Sept. 18.—Mr. Branchflower, an aged man, residing on Laurel street, who was doing some carpenter work at Everett Wigle's sawmill, east of town, fell and broke his right shoulder-bone. After the fracture had been reduced by a physician Mr. Branchflower was removed to his home, where he is resting well as can be expected.

Get New Plan To Improve Housing Commission Routine.

Too many cooks are spoiling the broth for the London Housing Commission, that body decided last night on diagnosing the situation. More than thirty applications for loans have been approved, but only a comparatively small number of houses are under way, largely because none of the officials have been definitely responsible for proceeding with the plans.

City Clerk Baker will lay a plan for improved routine before the next meeting. The commission thinks that at present it is not definitely understood who is to see that the work is proceeded with immediately. Mr. Baker will likely recommend that an assistant be obtained for Building Inspector A. M. Piper, to deal with the office work. Immediately on an application being approved notification would be sent to the interested parties, asking them to see the building inspector and make arrangements with him to proceed with the work immediately.

WOMAN IS KILLED IN MOTOR CAR ACCIDENT

HAMILTON, Sept. 18.—Mrs. Thos. Webb of Mount Hamilton was almost instantly killed last night at Port Nelson when an automobile in which she was riding with her husband and her sister, Mrs. John Hunter of Burlington Beach, was struck by a radial car. Webb and Mrs. Hunter were badly hurt. A hedge along a lane approaching the tracks hid Webb's view of the radial car. An inquest has been ordered.

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STEAMER FOR RUMANIA.

LONDON, Sept. 18.—The steamer Santeramo, chartered by the Canadian mission to carry general merchandise from Montreal to Rumania under the government credit, left here for Montreal today. She will probably be followed by two other steamers before navigation closes on the St. Lawrence.

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Firemen Called to "Fire" Get Gas Meant for Bugs

Lighted Disinfectant in House Gives Fumes and Blaze Appearance.

Passersby on the street in front of a vacant house at 359 Dufferin avenue at 8:30 o'clock last night saw a flickering light through the windows and yelled "fire" over the phone to the fire department.

Firemen were nearly suffocated when they entered the house in response to the alarm, and staggered in the rooms in search of the fire.

They found a small container in which disinfectants were burning to kill bugs in the building. The occupants had vacated the house after lighting the disinfectant.

HAMILTON'S POPULATION SHRINKS, BUT CITY IS GLAD TO MISS SOME

HAMILTON, Sept. 18.—Hamilton's population has shrunk to 108,143, a decrease of 1,994, according to the returns made public by the assessment department today. City officials are not worrying, though. The heavy exodus of foreigners who have been leaving in large numbers since the armistice was signed, a class Hamilton is satisfied to be rid of, explains the slump.

DIPHTHERIA OUTBREAK IN ST. KITT'S SCHOOLS

ST. CATHARINES, Sept. 18.—An outbreak of diphtheria has occurred in the local public schools. Dr. Curry, medical officer of health, announced that steps had been taken to check the outbreak. The schools will be closed unless the disease becomes more prevalent.

ILLEGIT STILL FOUND IN AN OLD BAKESHOP

ST. CATHARINES, Sept. 18.—Police officials here made a fine haul this morning when they found an illicit still in the old Boyd bakeshop, 214 North road, with 243 gallons of liquor under ferment. As a result, Joseph Pariselli, an Italian, appeared before Police Magistrate Campbell in police court this morning.

The officers found a large kitchen stove with hot water piping carried into another room. There they discovered a large tank filled with a fermenting mass mixed with yeast, water and brown sugar. In another room were found three whiskey barrels ready for filling and a number of bottles. The case was adjourned until Monday.

Allies Fully Agreed As To Solution of the Fiume Question

ROME, Tuesday, Sept. 18.—(By the Associated Press)—The Messagero says David Lloyd George, the British prime minister, M. Clemenceau, the French premier, and Signor Tittoni, the Italian foreign minister, are in perfect accord over a definite solution of the Fiume question.
