W. E. Kelly Home From Toronto Convention.

That all children for adoption in the Province of Ontario should be placed through and as wards of the Children's Aid Society was the gist of a resolution carried at the two-day convention of officers of the Children's Aid societies in Toronto last week, and which was attended by Inspector W. E. Kelly of the London society.

The claim of the convention in passing the resolution, according to Mr. Kelly, was that frequently children are placed independently by one or both parents in undesirable foster-homes Sometimes all trace of the children is lost so far as the provincial of other authorities are concerned. Frequently the foster-parents do not know the names or the ages of the children they adopt, and sometimes the foster-homes constitute a very bad environment both from moral and health standpoints.
