### IS UNITED STATES NAVY **WORTHLESS, OR IS IT O.K.?**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.-Rear Admiral Washington Lee Capps, chief constructor of the navy department, before the senate commission on naval affairs, replied to the magazine article written by Henry Reuterdahl in criticism of the construction of the American warships. The admiral asserted that the American warships are the equal of any in the world. The most serious charges made, he said, were of insufficent freeboard, meaning the height from waterline to deck; insufficent gun height, and improper location of main line armor belts, and all these he explained have been the subject of the closest study and expirement for many years by naval designers of every country.
