## IS DANGEROUS CROSSING

Father of Boy Hurt by Train Calls for Investigation.

John Swithbank, whose son Fred was seriously injured in the crossing accident at Streetsville in which Thomas Gant was killed, said yesterday while visiting his son at St. Michael's Hospital, that he intended to see that an investigation was held.

Coroner Lawson decided not to hold an inquest because a man who was working in a field near the scene of the fatality asserted that all necessary warning had been given by the engineer of the train. Swithbank said he wanted to know exactly how the accident happened and he wanted to see a guard rail erected on the crossing.

The crossing is an exceedingly dangerous one, being situated on a curve. It is said that a train cannot be seen until it is within 20 yards of the crossing.
