FIRE AT BROWN'S FLATS

Charles H. Gorham's House Burned With Loss of \$3,000 to \$4,000.

Brown's Flats, May 10—(Special)—The large double dwelling house here belonging to Charles H. Gorham together with the outbuildings, was totally destroyed by fire this morning with an estimated loss of between \$3,000 and \$4,000. There was very little insurance, only about \$700 in all.

Mr. Gorham was away from home, but his wife, who was in the house, escaped with only the clothing she wore. Mr. Gorham's mother, who is eighty years old and occupied half of the house, was the heaviest loser as she saved nothing. Besides her furniture and clothing she lost between \$20 and \$30 which she had in the house.
